

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# A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, the island was frequently used by Mi'kmaq Indians for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "the land cradled on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The island became a province in 1873.



The Armorial Bearings<sup>1</sup> of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown at left, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words Parva Sub Ingenti, which, when translated, read: The small under the protection of the great. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

# Provincial Flag

The design of the Prince Edward Island flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white.



## **Provincial Flower**

The Lady's Slipper was adopted as the provincial flower on April 25, 1947. The orchid gets its name from the shape of its petals, which form a pouch somewhat like a slipper.



## Provincial Tree

The Red Oak was adopted as the provincial tree in 1987. At one time the Red Oak was widely distributed in the hardwood areas of the province. It was used in shipbuilding and making barrels for dry goods.




## **Provincial Bird**

During the 1977 session of the PEI Legislative Assembly, the Blue Jay was officially named the provincial bird. It was chosen after a province-wide public vote held during Environment Week in 1976. Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.

# Economic Review 2002

# Overview

As a result of the strong recovery in the potato production, a buoyant residential construction sector and solid growth across most sectors, the Prince Edward Island economy performed well in 2002. Statistics Canada estimates that the provincial economy expanded by 5.6 per cent in constant dollars following no growth in 2001. This expansion was the second largest in the country. Economic performance in 2001 was negatively effected by a severe drought, which reduced potato and other crop yields. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2002 is estimated to be \$3,767 million. The national economy expanded by 3.4 per cent in 2002, up from 1.5 per cent a year earlier.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP indicate that in 2002 the leading growth sectors in the province were: fishing (up 23.1 per cent), agriculture (up 20.2 per cent), information and culture services (up 9.1 per cent), construction (up 9.1 per cent), business services (up 7.9 per cent) and manufacturing (up 7.5 per cent).

The general rise in consumer prices in 2002, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI), for Prince Edward Island was 2.7 per cent, up 0.1 percentage point from 2001. Leading factors contributing to this rise were sharp increases in the price of motor vehicle insurance premiums (up 39 per cent) and cigarettes (up 29 per cent). Energy prices were 4.8 per cent lower in 2002 than 2001. Prices increased, on average, by 2.2 per cent in 2002 in Canada.

Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.8 per cent in 2002 to average 67,100 employed per month, an all-time high for the province. These employment gains translated into total labour income growth of 6.3 per cent in 2002. The unemployment rate averaged 12.1 per cent in 2002, slightly higher than the 11.9 per cent recorded a year earlier, largely as a result of high labour force participation.

After a modest increase of 1.5 per cent in 2001, the value of manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island bounced back strongly in 2002 with an increase of 9.5 per cent, to value \$1,316 million. This was slightly lower than the average annual growth rate of 12 per cent since 1996.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in further detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2002.

# The Canadian Economy

In 2002 the Canadian economy outperformed all industrialized countries, posting 3.4 per cent growth in real GDP. This compares to 2.4 per cent growth in the United States, 1.5 per cent among OECD members, and 0.8 per cent in the European Union. Canada's resilience in the face of global uncertainties is attributed to strong domestic demand and effective monetary and fiscal measures.





Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2000 and 2002. It indicates that, after weak growth in 2001, the national economy strengthened through 2002. The surge in economic growth in 2002 waned at year end, when fourth-quarter GDP slowed to a 0.4 per cent gain in volume after three consecutive quarters of growth averaging over 1 per cent. Overall in 2002, Canada's economy

posted real GDP growth of 3.4 per cent, significantly higher than the 1.5 per cent attained in 2001. The expansion, measured in 1997 dollars, was led by consumer spending (up 2.9 per cent) followed by gross fixed capital formation (up 2.5 per cent) and government expenditures (up 2 per cent). It is noticeable that the role of international trade was modest in 2002, in contrast to the performance in the 1990s.

Concern over inflationary pressures and an overheating economy caused the *Bank of Canada* to raise its target for the overnight lending rate three times during 2002: from 2 per cent in January 2002 to 2.25 per cent in April, 2.50 per cent in June, and 2.75 per cent in July 2002. During the first four months of 2003 the bank's key overnight rate was raised twice: to 3 per cent on March 4 and 3.25 per cent on April 15. Diagram 2 illustrates the course of the overnight target rate from 2001.



Diagram 3 shows quarterly personal expenditures in real terms between 2000 and 2002. As can be seen, consumer spending rebounded in the last quarter of 2001 and through 2002, as a result of relatively low interest rates, which reduced mortgage rates and the cost of consumer credit. This resulted in a 2.9 per cent annual growth rate in real consumer spending in 2002. Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods

and services rose from \$621 billion in 2001 to \$651 billion in 2002, an increase of 4.9 per cent. Current dollar spending on durable and semi-durable goods increased by 5.8 per cent, while non-durables and services increased by 5.2 and 4.4 per cent, respectively.

Largely as a result of lower energy costs, the average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, fell from 2.6 per cent in 2001 to 2.2 per cent in 2002. The core inflation rate, i.e., the All-Items Index with the effects of energy and food prices removed, rose from 2 per cent in 2001 to 2.7 per cent in 2002.



In 2002 national employment increased from 15.1 million in 2001 to 15.4 million in 2002, an increase of 2.2 per cent. Diagram 4 shows that most job creation occurred in the service-providing sector, especially in the health, education, and public administration sectors. In the goods-producing sector the loss of employment in the primary sector was offset by an increase in manufacturing and construction employment. The national unemployment rate rose to 7.7 per cent in 2002 from 7.2 per cent a year earlier.

# The Prince Edward Island Economy

#### Gross Domestic Product



estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 5.6 per cent in 2002, after experiencing virtually no growth in 2001, largely as a result of the impact of the drought on the potato harvest. Diagram 5 shows percentage gains in provincial GDP since 1998. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2002 is estimated at \$3,767 million. Growth in 2002 was highlighted by the recovery in potato production,

growth in manufacturing and business services, a buoyant residential construction sector, improvements across most sectors, and rising employment.

#### Consumer Prices



The All-Items Consumer Price Index for Prince Edward Island rose by 2.7 per cent in 2002, compared to 2.2 per cent nationally. Energy prices were on average 4.8 per cent lower in 2002, though as Diagram 6 shows, the national and provincial energy price indexes increased from January 2002 to February 2003. Particularly noteworthy is the period March to November 2002, when energy prices rose by 22 per cent on Prince Edward


Island compared to a 7 per cent increase nationally. Highest year-over-year price increases for Islanders in 2002 were for motor vehicle insurance premiums, up 39 per cent, and cigarettes, up 29 per cent.

#### Labour Force

**Employment on Prince Edward** Island rose to 67,100 in 2002, an increase of 1,200 from a year earlier. This was the largest annual number of employed persons ever recorded in Island history. As Diagram 7 indicates, all employment gains occurred in the service-providing sector with the largest increases in the business and financial services sector. Employment in the service-providing sector grew by 2.9 per cent in 2002, while growth in the goods-producing sector fell by 1.1 per cent.





The unemployment rate averaged 12.1 per cent in 2002, compared to 11.9 per cent recorded one year earlier. This increase occurred largely because the labour force participation rate rose from 67.6 per cent in 2001 to 68.2 per cent in 2002. Diagram 8 shows monthly trends in unemployment and employment. The monthly unemployment rate on Prince

Edward Island has been trending down since October 1993, when it stood at 19.5 per cent. Diagram 8 also shows the upward trend in employment since 1999.

#### Income

Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose from \$3,141 million in 2001 to \$3,344 million in 2002, an increase of 6.5 per cent. The major contributors to this growth were labour income and net unincorporated non-farm business income.

Diagram 9 shows labour income growth in 2002 for Canada and the provinces. Prince Edward Island placed third among the provinces with 6.3 per cent growth in total labour income. This compares to a national growth rate of 4.6 per cent. The largest components of personal income for Prince Edward Island in 2002 were labour income (56 per cent), government transfer payments to persons (19 per cent) and income from interest, dividends and other investments (13 per cent).

Federal government transfers to persons are estimated to be 3.8 per cent higher in 2002 due to increases in Canada Child Tax Benefits (CCTB), Canada Pension Plan (CPP) benefits and Employment Insurance (EI) benefits. CCTB payments were valued at \$41 million in 2002, while CPP payments totalled \$126 million that year. EI benefits paid on Prince Edward Island in 2002 totalled \$196.7 million, an increase of 4.2 per cent from 2001. This increase is mainly attributed to a 15.5 per cent rise in the value of fishing benefits.

Statistics Canada estimates that income derived from interest, dividends and other investments has decreased by 7.6 per cent in 2002 as a result of poor market conditions. This negative impact on personal income growth was counteracted to a large degree by net farm income, which rose from an estimated -\$23 million in 2001 to an all-time high of \$81 million in 2002 as a result of the recovery in the potato sector.

# **Population**


According to Statistics Canada's preliminary estimates, the Island population reached 139,913 <sup>(2)</sup> on July 1, 2002, an increase of 1,009 persons or 0.7 per cent from 2001. Natural increases, i.e. total births minus total deaths, contributed 24 per cent to this change, while 10 per cent can be attributed to international migration and 66 per cent to interprovincial migration. The majority of persons

moving to Prince Edward Island from other provinces came from Ontario, Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. According to the 2001 Census of Population, the majority of immigrants that arrived on PEI between 1996 and 2001 came from Yugoslavia, Croatia, the United States and the United Kingdom. During the last 25 years the Island population increased by 16.6 per cent, which compares to a national growth rate of 32.4 per cent.

# **Industrial Profiles**

# Manufacturing




In 2002 the value of total manufacturing shipments was \$1,316 million, an increase of 9.5 per cent from 2001. Food shipments, excluding fish products, were \$539 million, an increase of 2.4 per cent. Processed fish products, totalling \$413.5 million, expanded by 16.2 per cent in value in 2002, while the value of all other manufacturing on Prince Edward Island increased by 14 per cent to reach \$363.5 million.

Diagram 10 shows the annual value of provincial manufacturing shipments between 1992 and 2002. Fish products have played an increasingly important role in Island manufacturing, expanding from \$113 million in 1992 to \$413 million in 2002, an increase of \$300 million. In comparison, the value of other food products increased by \$286 million during that period, while the value of all non-food manufacturing rose by \$239 million.

In 2002 the manufacturing sector provided 9.4 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector remained the same as in 2001 at 6,300.

## **Exports**

After a 2.4 per cent decline in 2001, Prince Edward Island's export performance of goods in 2002 improved by 1.9 per cent and valued \$679.1 million. Fresh and processed food products, valued at \$507.7 million, represented about 75 per cent of the value of international exports in 2002, as illustrated in Diagram 11. While the value of internationally exported frozen food products fell by 2.3 per cent in 2002, the value of fish

and raw potato exports increased by 28.4 per cent. Other exports in 2002 included \$64.6 million in machinery and equipment, \$20.1 million in industrial goods, \$14.6 million in forestry products, and \$72.1 million in other Island-made products.

# Agriculture

Total farm cash receipts for Prince Edward Island reached an all-time high of \$369.6 million in 2002, an increase of 9.5 per cent from a year ago. Favourable weather conditions during the summer of 2002, following the disastrous 2001 season, resulted in a 57 per cent increase in the harvested potato crop with a volume estimated at 28,890,000 cwts.

Table 1 shows the recent trends in farm cash receipts by major commodity from 1997 to 2002. The estimated value of \$194 million in potato receipts in 2002 set a new record for Prince Edward Island. However, total livestock receipts fell by 5.8 per cent in 2002 as hog and cattle receipts declined. Government support payments to farm operators declined by 60 per cent from 2001, when compensation payments relating to the potato diversion program and increased crop insurance payouts were at an all-time high.

#### Retail Trade




Diagram 12 illustrates growth in retail sales on Prince Edward Island and Canada from 1992 to 2002. In only three years did the nation's growth rate exceed that of PEI Provincial retail sales expanded by 4.2 per cent in 2001 and 3.4 per cent in 2002. This compares to a national growth rate of 4.4 and 6 per cent, respectively. Total retail sales on Prince Edward Island were valued at \$1.3 billion in 2002.

The number of new motor vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island totalled 4,996 in 2002, an increase of 7.8 per cent from 2001 compared to a 5.4 per cent decline in 2001. This represents a value of \$131.2 million, up 8.7 per cent from 2001.

The wholesale/retail trade sector continues to be the largest private sector employer in the province with 9,500 people employed in 2002. Since 1992 employment in this sector has grown 20 per cent.

## **Fisheries**

The *PEI Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Environment* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2002 fell by 0.4 per cent to \$164.3 million. Snowcrab and bluefin tuna quotas increased in 2002, but herring landings declined by 21 per cent to 34 million pounds due to quota reductions. The value of pelagic and estuarial catches was 9.4 per cent lower than in 2001, while the proceeds from molluscs and crustaceans other than lobster was at par with last year's value.


The value of groundfish landings was 31 per cent lower. The 2002 lobster catch of 19.9 million pounds was slightly higher than a year earlier. Total revenue from lobster landings rose 0.5 per cent in 2002 to an all-time record value of \$105.4 million as a result of strong prices.

# **Forestry**

The *PEI Department of Agriculture and Forestry* estimates that the volume of primary forest products rose by 8.8 per cent, from 703,572 cubic metres in 2001 to 765,759 cubic metres in 2002. The total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island rose from 417,759 cubic metres in 2001 to 460,650 cubic metres in 2002, an increase of 10.3 per cent. Industrial wood production rose by 9.6 per cent in 2002, while the production of fuel wood and fuel chips rose by 5.7 per cent. According to Statistics Canada, wood industry shipments were valued at \$60 million in 2002, up 14.1 per cent from 2001.

The Canada-U.S. softwood lumber dispute had little direct effect on Island production, since Prince Edward Island is exempt from the countervailing duty imposed on the four major lumber-producing provinces – British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario and Quebec, where softwood is primarily harvested on crown lands. Most Island softwood is harvested on private land.

#### **Tourism**





Diagram 13 shows that the number of persons that visited the Island for pleasure or business has been in decline since 1998, while their spending has been trending upward. According to the *PEI Department of Tourism*, between May and October 2002 an estimated total of 1.1 million pleasure tourists and 45,417 business visitors spent a total of \$353 million while vacationing or conducting business on Prince Edward Island. This is a 3 per cent

decrease in visitor numbers, while tourism revenue rose by 7.5 per cent from 2001, according to Tourism PEI.

In 2002, pleasure visitors accounted for about 96 per cent of all visits, with 75 per cent coming from Canada and 22 per cent originating in the United States. Ontario continued to provide the largest share of pleasure visitors in 2002 at 27 per cent, followed by Nova Scotia at 20 per cent and New Brunswick at 10 per cent. The number of pleasure visitors from the United States was 0.5 per cent higher in 2002 than in 2001.

### Construction and Investment





In 2002 Prince Edward Island experienced a residential housing boom as illustrated in Diagram 14, which shows the total number of housing starts since 1992. Housing starts reached a 13-year high of 775 units, an increase of 15 per cent from 2001. In contrast, non-residential construction declined in 2002, as illustrated by the fact that non-residential building permits in 2002 were valued at \$47 million, 70 per cent below the record-breaking high of \$152.9 million recorded in 2001.

Statistics Canada estimates the value of private and public investment for Prince Edward Island in 2002 to be \$652.4 million, an increase of 9.2 per cent compared to 2001. The value of construction rose by 8.3 per cent in 2002, while the value of investment in machinery and equipment increased by 10.5 per cent.

# **Transportation**

Prince Edward Island has several transportation links to the mainland: the Confederation Bridge; the *Marine Atlantic* ferry service from Souris, PEI to the Magdalen Islands; *Northumberland Ferries* between Wood Islands, PEI and Caribou, NS; the Charlottetown Airport; and the ports of Charlottetown, Summerside, Souris and Georgetown. Most visitors to the Island travel across the privately owned Confederation Bridge. According to estimates provided by the *PEI Department of Transportation and Public Works*, a total of 1.6 million vehicles crossed the Confederation Bridge in both directions in 2002, up 3 per cent from 2001.



As Diagram 15 indicates, growth in the number of passengers using the Charlottetown Airport has been quite volatile over the last 10 years. Re-structuring of the airline industry has affected air passenger traffic during the last few years. In 2002 a total of 158,746 travellers passed through the airport, down 10 per cent from the previous year.

The ferry service between Prince Edward Island and the Magdalen Islands, Quebec, carried 17.4 per cent more passengers in 2002, while vehicle traffic was up by 14.8 per cent. The number of passengers taking the PEI to Nova Scotia ferry service was up by 0.7 per cent, while the number of vehicles ferried across was up by 1.7 percent from 2001.


#### The Public Service Sector

In 2002, the public service sector, i.e., federal/provincial/municipal public administration, educational services, and health and social services, accounted for 27 per cent of provincial GDP at factor cost and 28 per cent of total Island employment. According to Statistics Canada, real public sector GDP at factor cost rose from \$800 million in 2001 to \$817.5 million in 2002, an increase of 2.2 per cent, at par with growth in 2001.

According to Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH), employment in public administration (federal, provincial and municipal) decreased by 2.6 per cent in 2002. Education services experienced job growth of 2.7 per cent in 2002, while the health and social services industry showed virtually no job growth.

#### **Provincial Finances**

In fiscal year (FY) 2001/02, total revenue received for the Province of Prince Edward Island was \$973.6 million, up 2.3 per cent from 2000/01. Provincial tax revenues increased to \$459.7 million in FY 2001/02, which is a 4.1 per cent improvement from FY 2000/01. Equalization payments increased by 4.4 per cent from 2001, to value \$282.3 million, while CHST payments advanced 15.9 per cent to total \$88.9 million. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 41 per cent to the

province's total revenue. Total expenditures increased by 2 per cent to reach \$981.9 million. According to the PEI Public Accounts' *Operating Fund*, the deficit for FY 2001/02 was \$17 million after pension adjustment, compared to \$11.6 million in FY 2000/01. As of 31 March, 2002, the net debt was \$1,053 million, up 1.6 per cent from 2001. Diagram 16 illustrates the decline in the province's Net Debt-to-GDP ratio since 1995.






