



This 30<sup>th</sup> edition also contains a comprehensive narrative on the economic performance of the province in 2003, and a



## A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, the island was frequently used by Mi'kmaq Indians for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the island for Francis I, King of France, on 1 July 1534. In 1720 the island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings <sup>(1)</sup> of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on 13 December 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties – Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

#### Provincial Flag

The design of the Prince Edward Island flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white.



#### **Provincial Flower**

The Lady's Slipper was adopted as the provincial flower on April 25, 1947. The orchid gets its name from the shape of its petals, which form a pouch somewhat like a slipper.



#### Provincial Tree

The Red Oak was adopted as the provincial tree in 1987. At one time the Red Oak was widely distributed in the hardwood areas of the province. It was used in shipbuilding and making barrels for dry goods.



#### **Provincial Bird**

During the 1977 session of the PEI Legislative Assembly, the Blue Jay was officially named the provincial bird. It was chosen after a province-wide public vote held during Environment Week in 1976. Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.

## Economic Review 2003

#### Overview

Following their strong performance in 2002, the national and provincial economies experienced a reduced level of growth in 2003. Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 1.7 per cent in constant dollars following 3.3 per cent growth in 2002. The Prince Edward Island economy grew by an estimated 1.9 per cent in 2003, down from 5.7 per cent growth a year earlier. Economic performance in 2003 was accompanied by positive employment growth, gains in labour income and strong residential construction activity. Weak retail sales, a decline in export activity and lower tourist numbers were offsetting factors. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2003 is estimated to be \$3,883 million.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP by industry indicate that in 2003 the leading growth sectors in the province were: manufacturing (up 7.0 per cent), professional, scientific and technical services (up 4.7 per cent), wholesale trade (up 4.0 per cent) and finance, insurance and real estate services (up 2.9 per cent).

The general rise in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 3.6 per cent in 2003, up 0.9 percentage point from last year. Leading factors contributing to this rise were sharp increases in the price of motor vehicle insurance premiums (up 26.9 per cent) and cigarettes (up 20 per cent). Energy prices were 11.2 per cent higher in 2003 than 2002. In Canada prices increased by 2.8 per cent in 2003.


Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 2.5 per cent in 2003 to average 68,800 per month, surpassing the all-time high of 67,100 in 2002. These employment gains translated into total labour income growth of 3.7 per cent in 2003. The unemployment rate averaged 11.1 per cent in 2003, a full percentage point lower than in 2002.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island were valued at \$1,356 million in 2003, an increase of 2.2 per cent. This compares to 8.6 per cent growth in 2002. According to Statistics Canada, Island export performance fell from \$683 million in 2002 to \$639.4 million in 2003, a decline of 6.4 per cent.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2003.

### The Canadian Economy

The Canadian economy slowed considerably in 2003 from its performance a year earlier. Annual growth of 1.7 per cent in real GDP for 2003 was significantly below last year's growth rate of 3.3 percent. The major economic event last year was the turnaround in the Canadian dollar against its U.S. counterpart. The 21.7 per cent increase from 63.39 cents (U.S.) to 77.13 cents (U.S.) during the year was the largest 12-month movement up or down in Canada's history. Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) and Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE); the power blackout in August; the war in Iraq; as well as natural disasters such as floods/fires in British Columbia and Hurricane Juan in Atlantic Canada, were also factors in the economy's slowdown.



Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2001 and 2003. It indicates that, after six consecutive quarters of positive economic growth, the national economy weakened in the second quarter of 2003. This drop of 0.2 per cent was followed by a steady recovery of 0.3 and 0.9 per cent in the last two quarters of that year. The overall expansion in 2003 (mea-sured in chained 1997 dollars) was led by gross fixed capital formation (up 4.9 per cent) followed

by consumer spending (up 3.3 per cent) and government expenditures (up 3 per cent). The role of net international trade diminished in 2003 with total exports down by 2.1 per cent and imports up by 4 per cent.

In contrast to Canada, the U.S. economy showed robust growth of 3.1 per cent in 2003. This compares to 2.2 per cent growth in 2002 and 0.5 per cent in 2001. Its economic performance was highlighted by increases in consumer demand, federal spending on national defense, and private investment. However, U.S. employment declined by 0.3 per cent in 2003, while the unemployment rate crept up from 5.8 per cent in 2002 to 6 per cent last year.





Both Canada and the United States have adopted accommodative monetary policies in response to the challenging economic developments since 2001, as illustrated by the movements in the key policy interest rates in Diagram 2. In 2003 the *Bank of Canada* lowered its target for the overnight lending rate twice: from 3.25 per cent to 3 per cent in July and to 2.75 per cent in September. Further reductions have occurred in 2004. In contrast to Canada, the *U.S.* 

*Federal Reserve Bank* lowered its target lending rate only once in 2003: from 1.25 per cent to 1 per cent in June, where it remained at the time of publication.

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$656.2 billion in 2002 to \$689.4 billion in 2003, an increase of 5.1 per cent. Current dollar spending on durable goods rose by 1.6 per cent, while semi-durable goods increased by 2.7 per cent in 2003. Non-durables and services increased by 6.5 and 5.7 per cent, respectively.

The average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, rose from 2.2 per cent in 2002 to 2.8 per cent in 2003. This was largely the result of higher prices for alcohol and tobacco products (up 10 per cent), energy (up 7.9 per cent) and transportation (up 5.2 percent).





National employment rose from 15.4 million in 2002 to 15.7 million in 2003, an increase of 2.2 per cent, matching growth in 2002. The goodsproducing sector added 43,600 jobs to the economy, while the service-providing sector expanded by 290,600 jobs. As shown in Diagram 3, job creation in 2003 occurred across all sectors of the economy with the exception of manufacturing, where employment fell by 1.4 per cent from 2002. The public sector (health,

education, and public administration) experienced the largest employment growth with an increase of 4.4 per cent. The national unemployment rate fell slightly, from 7.7 per cent in 2002 to 7.6 per cent in 2003.

## The Prince Edward Island Economy


#### Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada's preliminary estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 1.9 per cent in constant dollars in 2003, after experiencing 5.7 per cent growth in 2002. Diagram 4 shows gains in real provincial GDP since 1992. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2003 is estimated by Statistics Canada to be \$3,883 million.


#### **Consumer Prices**


The All-Items Consumer Price Index for Prince Edward Island rose by 3.6 per cent in 2003, compared to 2.8 per cent nationally. Energy prices were on average 11.2 per cent higher in 2003. Particularly noteworthy is the period February 2002 to March 2003 (see Diagram 5), when energy prices rose by 37.4 per cent on the Island compared to a 22.1 per cent increase nationally. Between March and December 2003 the provincial index fell by 14.4 per cent, while the national index dropped 8.9 per cent.

Diagram 6 shows the historical trends for two particular items that experienced very high year-over-year price increases for Islanders in the last two years. Increases in vehicle insurance premiums were 31.3 per cent in 2002 before easing somewhat to 26.9 per cent in 2003. Cigarette price increases were 29.3 per cent in 2002 before falling to 20 per cent in 2003, largely the result of provincial tax increases.

#### Labour Force





Employment on Prince Edward Island rose to 68,800 in 2003, surpassing last year's all-time high of 67,100, increasing by 2.5 per cent. As Diagram 7 indicates, most employment gains occurred in the service-providing sector with the largest increases occurring in health, education and public administration. Employment losses in the goodsproducing sector were mostly offset by gains in the manufacturing sector. Employment in the service-providing

sector expanded by 4.1 per cent in 2003, while growth in the goods-producing sector fell by 1.1 per cent.

In 2003 there were 35,300 males and 33,500 females employed on Prince Edward Island. The average unemployment rate fell from 12.1 per cent in 2002 to 11.1 per cent in 2003, the lowest rate since 1980. The labour force participation rate rose from 68.2 per cent in 2002 to 68.5 per cent in 2003.

#### Income



Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose from \$3,274 million in 2002 to \$3,285 million in 2003, an increase of only 0.3 per cent. As Diagram 8 illustrates, this was the lowest positive gain since 1982. The major contributors to growth were labour income (up 3.7 per cent) and net unincorporated non-farm business income (up 4.7 per cent).

By contrast, income derived from

interest, dividends and other investments decreased by 2.3 per cent in 2003 as a result of declining interest rates, while *net farm income* fell from \$66 million in 2002 to -\$6 million in 2003 due to declining potato and livestock receipts.

Federal government transfers to persons are estimated to be 1.5 per cent higher in 2003. Employment Insurance benefits paid on Prince Edward Island in 2003 were virtually unchanged from a year earlier at \$196.7 million. The value of regular benefits rose by 1.3 per cent from 2002, while fishing benefits fell by 16.8 per cent.

### **Population**


According to Statistics Canada's population estimates, the Island population reached 137,781<sup>(2)</sup> on 1 July, 2003, an increase of 783 persons or 0.6 per cent from 2002. Natural increases, i.e., total births minus total deaths, contributed 22 per cent to this change, while 5 per cent can be attributed to net international migration and 73 per cent to net interprovincial migration.


Diagram 9A (see next page) shows that natural growth has declined dramatically from 741 persons in 1990/91 to 171 persons in 2002/03. International net migration had less of an impact on Island population growth.

It peaked in 1996/97 at 149 persons and dropped to 17 persons in 2002/03. Growth from net inter-provincial migration has been more volatile, as can be seen in Diagram 9B.


Between July 1, 2002 and June 30, 2003, the majority of persons moving to Prince Edward Island came from Ontario (+1,085), Nova Scotia (+672), New Brunswick (+550), Alberta (+259) and Newfoundland and Labrador (+234). During that same period the provinces that attracted the largest numbers of Islanders were Ontario (-739), Nova Scotia (-574), New Brunswick (-479) and Alberta (-428).

## Manufacturing

In 2003 the value of total manufacturing shipments was \$1,356 million, an increase of 2.2 per cent from 2002. The value of processed food product shipments, which constituted 66.5 per cent of all shipments in 2003, fell by 1.0 per cent at \$902 million. As shown in Diagram 10, this was the second time during the last 10 years that growth in the value of food shipments was negative.

The drop in 2003 was mainly the result of an 8.5 per cent decline in the value of processed fish products, from \$342 million in 2002 to \$313 million in 2003. The value of processed potato and other food product shipments, increased by 3.5 per cent to value \$589 million. Non-food manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 9.2 per cent to reach \$454 million.


In 2003 the manufacturing sector provided 9.6 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector increased by 4.8 per cent, from 6,300 in 2002 to 6,600 in 2003.

### **Exports**

The total value of exported goods fell from its peak of \$683 million in 2002 to \$639.4 million in 2003, a decline of 6.4 per cent. This was the second time since 2000 that export growth turned negative, as illustrated in Diagram 11. Mainly the result of declining values of food products, the drop in 2001 was caused by the lingering effects of potato wart and near-drought conditions, while in 2003 a strong Canadian dollar together with challenging market

conditions for seafood products kept export values down.

In 2003 the value of exported food products, which made up 75 per cent of total international exports, fell from \$511.6 million in 2002 to \$478.1 million in 2003, a drop of 6.5 per cent. Other exports in 2003 included \$55.5 million in machinery and equipment, \$22.2 million in industrial goods, \$13 million in



forestry products, and \$70.6 million in Source: Statistics Canada other Island-made products.


## Agriculture

Total farm cash receipts for Prince Edward Island reached \$354.3 million in 2003, 2.7 per cent lower than the all-time high of \$364.0 million recorded in 2002. Table 1 shows the recent trends in farm cash receipts by major commodity from 1998 to 2003. Favourable weather conditions during the summer of 2003 resulted in a harvested potato crop estimated at 29,013,000 cwts. However, prices were low, resulting in a 1.8 per cent drop in potato receipts from \$189.9 million in 2002 to \$186.5 million in 2003. Total livestock receipts fell by 5.7 per cent in 2003, mainly the result of declining hog and cattle receipts. Government support payments to farm operators declined by 6.6 per cent from 2002.



Diagram 12 shows the annual change in selected Island farm product price indexes during the period 1997-2003. It illustrates that 2003 was a particularly difficult year for farmers, when low market prices caused the potato price index to drop by 26.7 per cent, while the cattle and calves price index declined 29.1 per cent as an indirect result of the occurrence of a single BSE case elsewhere in Canada. The hog price index fell 2.1 per cent between 2002 and 2003.

#### **Retail Trade**

The current value of retail sales on Prince Edward Island was \$1,318 million in 2003, down 0.4 per cent from 2002. Diagram 13 shows total retail sales classified by kind of business from 1993 to 2003. Total retail sales increased by 57 per cent during that period. The main growth components were: supermarket and grocery store sales (up 76 per cent), gasoline service station sales (up 58 per cent), motor vehicle dealer sales (up 51.4 per cent) and general

merchandise store sales (up 38.3 per cent). Other retail sales increased by 52 per cent between 1993 and 2003.

In 2003 there were 4,731 new motor vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island representing a value of \$127.5 million, down 2.8 per cent from 2002. The wholesale/retail trade sector continues to be the largest private sector employer in the province with 10,300 people employed in 2003.

## Fisheries and Forestry

The *P.E.I. Department of Agriculture, Fisheries, Aquaculture and Forestry* estimates that the preliminary value of total fish landings in 2003 fell by 2.3 per cent to \$164.9 million. The snowcrab quota in 2003 was reduced by 30 per cent, while the bluefin tuna quota decreased slightly that year. Herring landings declined by 23 per cent, at 31.4 million pounds due to lower landings at Island ports.

The value of pelagic and estuarial catches was 14.5 per cent lower than in 2002, while the proceeds from molluscs and crustaceans other than lobster fell by 14 per cent. The value of groundfish landings was 62.5 per cent lower. The 2003 lobster catch of 20 million pounds was slightly higher than a year earlier. Total revenue from lobster landings rose 4.4 per cent in 2003 to an all-time record value of \$110 million as a result of strong prices.

The department estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island increased from 643,616 cubic metres in 2002 to 677,031 cubic metres in 2003, an increase of 5.2 per cent. The volume of primary forest product shipments rose by 2.5 per cent, from 766,000 cubic metres in 2002 to 785,367 cubic metres in 2003. Industrial wood production


rose by 1.7 per cent in 2003, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips rose by 4.8 per cent. According to Statistics Canada, wood industry shipments were valued at \$50.6 million in 2003, up 6.6 per cent from 2002.

#### **Tourism**

According to the *PEI Department of Tourism*, between May 15 and October 31, 2003 an estimated total of 1.06 million pleasure tourists and 40,511 business visitors took a vacation or conducted business on Prince Edward Island. This is a 3.8 per cent decrease in total visitor numbers from 2002.

In 2003, pleasure visitors (excluding visitors by motorcoach) accounted for about 94 per cent of all visits, with 78 per cent coming from Canada and 20 per cent originating in the United States. Ontario continued to provide the largest share of pleasure visitors in 2003 at 28 per cent, followed by Nova Scotia at 21 per cent and New Brunswick and Quebec at 9 per cent each. The number of pleasure visitors from the United States was 13 per cent lower in 2003 than in 2002, while the number of international visitors increased by 4 per cent.

Statistics Canada estimates the value of total capital investment in 2003 to be \$657 million, up 2.7 per cent from 2002. The value of the construction component fell by 2.8 per cent, while the value of investment in machinery and equipment increased by 12.1 per cent. As Diagram 14 illustrates, total investment on Prince Edward Island has been rising since 1997. Public sector investment grew by 12.2 per cent between 1997 and 2003, while private investment increased by

50.5 per cent. Public sector investment on Prince Edward Island in 2003 was valued at \$139.6 million, a decrease of 3.2 per cent from 2002, while private investment rose by 4.4 per cent to \$516.9 million. Prince Edward Island's residential housing boom continued as the number of new houses built in 2003 increased by 5 per cent to reach 814 units, breaking last year's record of 775 units.

## **Transportation**

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. According to *PEI Department of Transportation and Public Works* estimates, about 1.5 million vehicles crossed the privately owned Confederation Bridge in both directions in 2003, down 1.9 per cent from 2002. Bridge traffic during the months of January and February 2003 was at par with 2002, while crossings during July and August 2003 were down by 3.8 per cent from the same period last year.

The *Marine Atlantic Ferry Service* from Souris, PEI to the Magdalen Islands, PQ carried 116,782 passengers and 44,223 vehicles during 286 voyages in 2003. This was up 3 per cent, 2.6 per cent and 3.6 per cent from 2002, respectively. The number of passengers taking the *Northumberland Ferries Ltd.* service between Wood Islands, PEI and Caribou, NS fell from 489,568 in 2002 to 444,052 in 2003, a decrease of 9.3 per cent. At the same time 171,482 vehicles of all kinds were transported, compared to 186,547 in 2002 for a decrease of 8.1 per cent.

In 2003 almost 81,100 persons flew into Prince Edward Island, while about 82,400 left the province by air. The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport was up by 3 per cent in 2003 compared to a 10.3 per cent decline one year ago.


#### The Public Service Sector

In 2003, the public service sector, i.e., federal/provincial/municipal public administration, educational services, and health and social services, accounted for 27 per cent of provincial chained GDP by industry and 28.3 per cent of total Island employment. According to Statistics Canada, real public sector GDP in chained 1997 dollars rose from \$825.0 million in 2002 to \$842.1 million in 2003, an increase of 2.1 per cent compared to 2.7 per cent growth last year.

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in public administration (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 20.7 per cent in 2003. Education services experienced job growth of 11.6 per cent in 2003, while employment in the health and social services sector increased by 2.3 per cent.

#### **Provincial Finance**

In fiscal year (FY) 2002/03, total revenue received for the Province of Prince Edward Island was 2.1 per cent lower than in FY 2001/02, at \$953.6 million. While provincial tax revenues increased to \$494.5 million in FY 2002/03, up 7.6 per cent from FY 2001/02, equalization payments fell by 21.2 per cent to value \$222.4 million. Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 0.7 per cent to total \$89.5 million in 2002/03. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 35 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2002/03 compared to 41 per cent last year. Total expenditures increased by 2.8 per cent to reach \$1,018.8 million in FY 2002/03.

The provincial *Public Accounts* indicate that the deficit on the Operating Fund for FY 2002/03 was \$65.1 million (after pension and retirement benefits adjustments) compared to a deficit of \$17 million in FY 2001/02, an increase of 2.8 per cent. As of March 31, 2003, the provincial net debt was \$1,118 million, up 6.2 per cent from 2002. Diagram 15 indicates that this was the first increase in the province's Net Debt-to-GDP ratio since 1997.








