




A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, the island was frequently used by the native Mi'kmaq for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the island for Francis I, King of France, on 1 July 1534. In 1720 the island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation," because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ⁽¹⁾ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on 13 December 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties – Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

Provincial Flag

The design of the Prince Edward I sland flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white.



Provincial Flower

The Lady's Slipper was adopted as the provincial flower on April 25, 1947. The orchid gets its name from the shape of its petals, which form a pouch somewhat like a slipper.



Provincial Tree

The Red Oak was adopted as the provincial tree in 1987. At one time the Red Oak was widely distributed in the hardwood areas of the province. It was used in shipbuilding and making barrels for dry goods.



Provincial Bird

During the 1977 session of the PEI Legislative Assembly, the Blue Jay was officially named the provincial bird. It was chosen after a province-wide public vote held during Environment Week in 1976. Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.

Economic Review 2005

Overview

Both the national and Island economies experienced strong growth in 2005. Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 2.9 per cent in constant dollars, the same rate of growth as a year earlier, while the Prince Edward Island economy grew by 2.0 per cent in 2005, up from 1.8 per cent growth in 2004. Economic performance on Prince Edward Island in 2005 was accompanied by positive employment growth, a rebound in fish processing activity and a strong non-residential construction sector. Retail sales improved after experiencing virtually no growth in 2004. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2005 is estimated to be \$4,142 million.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP by industry indicate that in 2005 the leading growth sectors in the province were: *finance, insurance and real estate services* (up by \$20.5 million or 3.4 per cent), *trade* (up by \$14.4 million or 4.2 per cent), *manufacturing* (up by \$12.2 million or 3.2 per cent), *construction* (up by \$5.8 million or 3.5 per cent) and *accommodations and food services* (up by \$4.7 million or 4.5 per cent).

The general rise in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 3.2 per cent in 2005. Leading factors contributing to this rise were higher prices for *energy* (up by 15.7 per cent), *housing* (up by 6.2 per cent) and *transportation* (up by 4.7 per cent). In Canada prices increased by 2.2 per cent in 2005.


Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.9 per cent in 2005 to average 68,200 per month, an all-time high. Total labour income increased by 4.4 per cent that year. The unemployment rate averaged 10.8 per cent in 2005 (the lowest rate since 1980), down from 11.3 per cent in 2004.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island reached an all-time high of \$1,486.7 million in 2005, an increase of 5.1 per cent. This compares to 4.3 per cent growth in 2004. According to Statistics Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods increased substantially: from \$644.4 million in 2004 to \$772.8 million in 2005, an increase of 19.9 per cent.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2005.

The Canadian Economy

The Canadian economy performed well in 2005, benefiting from strong growth in consumer spending on goods and services, export growth and strong non-residential investment. Annual growth of 2.9 per cent in real GDP for 2005 was identical to the previous year's growth. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2002 and 2005. After a steady expansion of 0.5 per cent in the first quarter


of 2005, the economy grew by 0.9 per cent in the next two quarters. To finish the year, real GDP increased by 0.6 per cent in the fourth quarter, keeping year-over-year growth steady at 2.9 per cent.

Final domestic demand continued to drive output led by *consumer spending* (up by \$25.6 billion or 4.0 per cent) followed by *gross fixed capital formation* (up by \$15.8 billion or 6.6 per cent) and *government expenditures* (up by \$5.9 billion or 2.8 per cent). High energy prices helped boost economy-wide incomes with much of these earnings reflected in a 10.7 per cent increase in corporate profits as well as a 5.4 per cent increase in wages, salaries and supplementary labour income. Partially offsetting economic growth were strong import gains (up by 23 per cent), which outpaced the increase in exports (up by 7 per cent).

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$721.2 billion in 2004 to \$762.0 billion in 2005, an increase of 5.6 per cent. Current dollar spending in 2005 on durable goods rose by 5.5 per cent, while expenditures on semi-durables and non-durables increased by 4.9 per cent and 6.6 per cent, respectively. Expenditures on services increased by 5.4 per cent that year.

The average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, rose from 1.9 per cent in 2004 to 2.2 per cent in 2005. The annual increase was largely the result of higher prices for *energy* (up by 9.7 per cent), *transportation* (up by 4.1 per cent) and *housing* (up by 3.1 per cent).

National employment rose from 15.9 million in 2004 to 16.2 million in 2005, an increase of 1.4 per cent. The goods-producing sector added 12,600 jobs to the economy, while the service-providing sector expanded by 210,100 jobs. As shown in Diagram 2, job creation in 2005 was strongest in the construction industry (7.1 per cent) and in the



primary industries (6.1 per cent). Employment declined in the *manufacturing*, *accommodations and food services* and *transportation and warehousing* sectors. The national unemployment rate fell from 7.2 per cent in 2004 to 6.8 per cent in 2005.

The U.S. economy continued to show strong economic growth in 2005, but at a reduced rate compared to 2004. Real GDP increased by 3.5 per cent in 2005 compared to 4.2 per cent growth in 2004. Its economic performance in 2005 was highlighted by strong consumer and government spending, as well as increased private sector investment in equipment and software. A large increase in imports partially offset economic growth. Employment increased by 1.5 per cent in 2005, after an increase of 1.1 per cent in 2004. As a result, the unemployment rate fell to 5.1 per cent in 2005 from 5.5 per cent a year earlier.

Both Canada and the United States continued on the path of removing monetary stimulus from their respective economies in 2005, but, as can be seen in Diagram 3, the United States adopted a more aggressive approach, particularly since August 2004. The Federal Reserve Board increased its key policy rate by 25 basis points in each of its last 13 rate announcements beginning in June 2004. The last increase

of 2005 occurred in December, when the rate reached 4.25 per cent. In contrast to the Federal Reserve action, the Bank of Canada adopted a somewhat more relaxed stance in its monetary policy between October 2004 and August 2005.


It was not until September 2005 that the *Bank of Canada* raised its target for the overnight lending rate by 25 basis points to 2.75 per cent, followed by a further increase to 3.00 per cent in October, and finally to 3.25 per cent in December.

The Canadian dollar appreciated against its U.S. counterpart in recent years. From a low of 62.49 U.S. cents in January 2002, the value of the Canadian dollar increased by 37.8 per cent to reach 86.13 U.S. cents in December 2005, a level not seen since 1992.

The Prince Edward Island Economy

Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada's preliminary estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 2.0 per cent in constant dollars in 2005, after experiencing 1.8 per cent growth in 2004. Diagram 4 shows growth in real provincial GDP since 1993. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2005 is estimated by Statistics Canada to be \$4,142 million.





Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island rose by 3.2 per cent in 2005, compared to 2.2 per cent nationally. Energy prices in 2005 were on average 15.7 per cent higher than one year ago.

Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 1999 and 2005. On September 1, 2005, the Island Regulatory and Appeals Commission raised the price of regular gasoline sold at self-serve stations to an unprecedented \$1.35 per litre. According to Statistics

Canada, gasoline sold for



an average price of \$1.21 per litre in Charlottetown that month, while heating oil sold for \$0.83 cents per litre.

Labour Force


Total employment on Prince Edward Island rose from 66,900 in 2004 to 68,200 in 2005, an increase of 1.9 per cent. This increase was the highest rate of growth in the Atlantic region and the second highest in the country. Employment in the goods-producing sector expanded by 2.9 per cent in 2005, while growth Source: Statistics Canada in the service-providing



sector rose by 1.6 per cent. As Diagram 6 indicates, employment gains occurred in most sectors with the exception of the health, education and public administration sector, the primary sector and the trade sector. The average unemployment rate fell from 11.3 per cent in 2004 to 10.8 per cent in 2005. The labour force participation rate rose slightly from 68.0 per cent in 2004 to 68.5 per cent in 2005.

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose from \$3,465 million in 2004 to \$3,566 million in 2005, an increase of 2.9 per cent. Diagram 7 shows personal income growth from 1996 to 2005. The contributors to growth in 2005 were labour income (up by \$89 million), government transfers to persons (up by \$22 million), and net


unincorporated non-farm business income (up by \$12 million). Partially offsetting was a decline in accrued net farm income (down by \$31 million).

Income derived from *interest, dividends and other investments* increased by 2.3 per cent to reach \$399 million in 2005. *Federal government transfers to persons* are estimated to be 3.2 per cent higher in 2005. *Employment Insurance* (E.I.) benefits paid on Prince Edward Island were 4.4 per cent higher than a year earlier at \$201.5 million. The value of regular E.I. benefits rose by 3.3 per cent from 2004, while fishing benefits increased by 1.5 per cent. Sickness benefits rose by 2.5 per cent in 2005, while maternity benefits grew by 1.2 per cent.

Population

According to Statistics Canada's estimates, the Island population reached 138,113 on July 1, 2005, an increase of 252 persons or 0.2 per cent from 2004. Natural increase, i.e., total births minus total deaths, contributed seven per cent to this change, while 43 per cent can be attributed to net international migration and 50 per cent to net inter-provincial migration. Between July 1, 2003, and June 30, 2004, the majority of Canadian residents moving to Prince Edward Island came from Ontario (+1,318), Nova Scotia (+540), New Brunswick (+514), Alberta (+384) and Newfoundland and Labrador (+345). During that same period the provinces that attracted the largest numbers of Islanders were Ontario (-1,187), Nova Scotia (-621), Alberta (-445) and New Brunswick (-445).

Diagram 8 shows the components that made up the Island's population growth between 1971 and 2004. It clearly shows a decline in the natural increase, i.e., the numbers of births minus the number of deaths, as well as the volatility of net interprovincial migration. Net international migration appears to have little impact on population growth.



Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

The value of Island manufacturing shipments rose strongly in 2005. Total shipments were valued at \$1,486.7 million that year, surpassing last year's record of \$1,414.2 million, for an increase of 5.1 per cent. Growth was mainly driven by fish processing and chemical manufacturing activity.




As illustrated by Diagram 9, the increase in the value of total manufacturing shipments is largely attributed to the manufacture of food products.

Total food manufacturing was valued at \$932.4 million in 2005, an increase of \$45.6 million or 5.1 per cent compared to 2004. The value of processed fish products increased by \$56.8 million or 22.9 per cent to \$305.0 million, while other processed food products, at \$627.4 million, fell by \$11.1 million or 1.7 per cent. Shipments of non-food manufacturing totaled \$554.3 million in 2005, an increase of \$26.9 million or 5.1 per cent from 2004. The single largest contributor to this growth was chemical manufacturing, which increased from \$94.8 million in 2004 to \$108.5 million in 2005, up by 14.5 per cent. Other manufacturing was valued at \$148.9 million, up by \$26.4 million or 21.5 per cent compared to 2004.

In 2005 the manufacturing sector provided 10 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the retail trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector reached an all-time high of 6,800.

Exports

According to Statistics
Canada, the total value of
exported goods rose from
\$644.4 million in 2004 to
\$772.8 million in 2005, an
increase of 19.9 per cent. As
Diagram 10 shows, this robust
growth came after several
years of slow growth in the
industry. Exports of
agriculture and fishing
products made up 65 per cent

of all international exports of goods in 2005, and its value rose from \$440.0 million in 2004 to \$501.0 million in 2005, an increase of 13.9 per cent. Other Island exports valued at \$271.8 million included \$87.8 million in machinery and equipment (up by 42.8 per cent from 2004), \$23.4 million in industrial goods (up by 8.8 per cent) and \$144.1 million in other Island-made products (up by 39.5 per cent). The value of Island forestry product shipments fell from \$18.1 million in 2004 to \$16.5 million in 2005, down by 8.8 per cent.

Agriculture

Market conditions in the agricultural sector on Prince Edward Island improved in 2005 and cash receipts returned to a more normal level. Total farm cash receipts for Prince Edward Island reached \$364.4 million that year, 4.7 per cent higher than in 2004. The growth in total receipts in 2005 was mainly the result of increased potato receipts. Table 1 shows the value of farm cash receipts by major commodity from 1998 to 2005.


After several years of low returns, market prices for potatoes improved in 2005, largely as a result of the voluntary reduction in the seeded acreage implemented in parts of Canada and the USA that year. On Prince Edward Island, farmers reduced their planted area from 106,000 acres in 2004 to 95,500 acres in 2005. This helped lift potato prices resulting in increased receipts of 6.9 per cent to a value of \$161.7 million. Total livestock receipts rose by 1.0 per cent to \$123.9 million. Increased cattle receipts (up by \$5.9 million or 41.7 per cent) were more than offset by declining hog receipts (down by \$6.5 million or 19.0 per cent). Government support payments to farm operators increased by 16.7 per cent to \$45.9 million in 2005.

Retail Trade

As illustrated in Diagram 11, following five years of declining growth, retail sales on Prince Edward Island rebounded in 2005. Sales were valued at \$1,428.3 million, up by 3.2 per cent from the previous year. Growth was driven by increased spending at gasoline stations, supermarkets and specialized building materials and garden stores, but was limited by reduced spending at home centres and hardware stores. Sales at used car dealerships also declined in 2005. Increased sales of new motor vehicles


contributed to overall growth in the retail sector as 4,847 vehicles (up by 3.2 per cent from 2004) were sold with a total value of \$126.4 million (up 1.2 per cent from 2004). Although employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector fell by 5.9 per cent to 9,500 people in 2005, it continues to be the largest private sector employer in the province.

Fisheries and Forestry


The *P.E.I. Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Aquaculture* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2005 fell by 2.0 per cent to \$163.7 million. As Diagram 12 shows, molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Prince Edward Island fishery comprising 84 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Due to poor weather conditions in 2005, lobster landings fell from 19.9 million lbs. to 18.5 million

lbs., a decline of 7.1 per cent. Lobster prices increased by 11.0 per cent to \$5.58/lb., while prices for other crustaceans and molluscs where at par with last year. Landings of other crustaceans and molluscs fell by 4.7 per cent from last year. Groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish and sea plants landings were at par with last year. Fish prices increased in 2005 for most species, except for cod (down by 11.3 per cent to 51.7 cents/lb.) and snowcrab (down 33 per cent to \$2.00/lb.).

The P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island fell from 704,000 cubic metres in 2004 to 633,000 cubic metres in 2005, a decrease of 10 per cent. During the last 10 years total wood production increased by an average of 2.4 per cent per



year. As Diagram 13 shows, hardwood production has been on an upward trend since 1998.

The volume of primary forest product shipments fell by 17.2 per cent, from 799 thousand cubic metres in 2004 to 662 thousand cubic metres in 2005. Industrial wood production decreased by 29.1 per cent in 2005, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips expanded by 12.1 per cent. According to Statistics Canada, wood industry shipments were valued at \$53.5 million in 2005, down 6.8 per cent from 2004.

Tourism

The 2005 tourism season was at par with 2004 according to the *P.E.I. Tourism Advisory Council*. Based on transportation data published by the Council, tourist traffic to the Island increased slightly that year. Both Confederation Bridge crossings and air traffic increased in terms of tourist volumes, by one per cent and 11 per cent respectively. However, ferry traffic declined by five per cent in 2005. The strong showing in tourism-related air traffic was supported by the introduction of two new seasonal flights in 2005: *Northwest Airlines*, with a daily direct flight from Detroit to Charlottetown (commenced July 1, 2005), and *WestJet* with daily flight service from Toronto to Charlottetown (commenced June 28, 2005).

With respect to other tourism indicators, golf rounds played at Island golf courses increased by three per cent in 2005; the number of cruise ship visitors rose by four per cent; and provincial park campsite rentals increased by five per cent compared to the previous year. On the negative side, tourist visitation at tourist information centres declined by 13 per cent in 2005, while visits to the Island's national park fell by 13 per cent and tourist visitation to historic sites declined by six per cent.

Construction and Investment

Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimates that there were 862 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2005, a decrease of 6.2 per cent from 2004. Although at a reduced level from 2004, housing starts in 2005 were strong by historical standards.

Non-residential construction activity was a key economic driver in 2005. According to Statistics Canada, investment in non-residential construction on Prince Edward Island was valued at \$116.8 million, an increase of 24.1 per cent from 2004. Major non-residential construction projects in 2005 included the new federal building, the Maritime Electric generator plant, the Wellness Centre and various projects on the University of P.E.I. campus.

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$768.3 million in 2005, an increase of 6.2 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment rose from \$109.9 million in 2004 to \$145.6 million in 2005, an increase of 32.5 per cent, while private sector investment rose by 1.5 per cent, from \$613.7 million in 2004 to \$622.7 million in 2005.

Transportation

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. According to *P.E.I.* Department of Transportation and Public Works estimates, about 1.5 million vehicles crossed the privately owned Confederation Bridge in both directions in 2005, at par with traffic data in 2004. Bridge traffic during the months of January and February 2005 was up by 2.8 per cent from 2004, while crossings during July and August 2005 increased by 1.8 per cent compared the same period last year.

The number of passengers taking the *Northumberland Ferries Ltd.* service between Wood Islands, P.E.I., and Caribou, N.S., fell from 410,328 in 2004 to 393,172 in 2005, a decrease of 4.2 per cent. At the same time 166,384 vehicles of all kinds were transported, compared to 176,540 in 2004 for an decrease of 5.8 per cent.

For three consecutive years, the total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport has been on the increase. In 2005, 93,983 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 13.0 per cent from 2004), while 95,564 people left the province by air (up by 11.3 per cent). Total air passenger traffic was up by 12.2 per cent compared to 2004.

In 2005 the volume of product received at Island seaports (with the exception of the Charlottetown port), including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 388,671 metric tonnes, up by 42.0 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 102,655 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly pulpwood and firewood, were shipped from Summerside and Georgetown ports.


The Public Service Sector

According to Statistics Canada, in 2005 the public service sector accounted for 27.3 per cent of provincial chained GDP by industry and 28.7 per cent of total Island employment. Real public sector GDP in chained 1997 dollars rose by 1.9 per cent in 2005, slightly lower than in 2004.

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) fell by 6.1 per cent in 2005. *Education* services experienced job growth of 6.0 per cent that year, while employment in the *health and social services* sector increased by a mere 0.2 per cent.

Provincial Finance

In fiscal year (FY) 2004/05 total revenue received for the Province of Prince - Edward Island was \$1,065.3 million, almost 7.0 per cent higher than in FY 2003/04. Provincial tax revenues were valued at \$624.1 million that year, an increase of 4.4 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed



40.0 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2004/05 compared to 38.5 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 15.1 per cent to value \$280.6 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 5.6 per cent to total \$109.6 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures fell by 2.6 per cent to reach \$1,097.4 million.

The provincial *Public Accounts* indicate that the deficit on the Operating Fund for FY 2004/05 was \$32.1 million, a major improvement over last year's deficit of \$130.4 million. As of March 31, 2005, the provincial net debt was \$1,276 million, up 2.0 per cent from 2004. Diagram 14 shows that, while every Islander owed \$7,280 in 1997, by 2005 this debt load had grown to \$9,260.


















