



A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, the island was frequently used by Mi'kmaq Indians for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the island for Francis I, King of France, on 1 July 1534. In 1720 the island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation," because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ⁽¹⁾ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on 13 December 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties – Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

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
Provincial Flag

The design of the Prince Edward Island flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white.



Provincial Flower

The Lady's Slipper was adopted as the provincial flower on April 25, 1947. The orchid gets its name from the shape of its petals, which form a pouch somewhat like a slipper.



Provincial Tree

The Red Oak was adopted as the provincial tree in 1987. At one time the Red Oak was widely distributed in the hardwood areas of the province. It was used in shipbuilding and making barrels for dry goods.



Provincial Bird

During the 1977 session of the PEI Legislative Assembly, the Blue Jay was officially named the provincial bird. It was chosen after a province-wide public vote held during Environment Week in 1976. Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.

Economic Review 2006

Overview

Both the national and Island economies expanded at a solid pace in 2006. Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 2.7 per cent in constant dollars, down slightly from the 2.9 per cent growth a year earlier, while the Prince Edward Island economy grew by 2.0 per cent in 2006, at par with last year's expansion. Economic performance on Prince Edward Island in 2006 benefited from strong non-residential construction, continued strength in fish processing, solid retail sales growth and positive employment gains. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2006 is estimated to be \$4,332 million.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP by industry indicate that in 2006 the leading growth sectors in the province were: *finance, insurance and real estate services* (up by \$19.6 million or 3.2 per cent), *construction* (up by \$17.1 million or 9.9 per cent), *fishing, hunting and trapping* (up by \$12.1 million or 19.9 per cent) and *agriculture* (up by \$10.2 million or 8.8 per cent).

The general rise in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 2.2 per cent in 2006. Leading factors contributing to this rise were higher prices for *energy* (up by 4.9 per cent), *food* (up by 3.2 per cent) and *transportation* (up by 3.1 per cent). In Canada prices increased by 2.0 per cent in 2006.


Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 0.6 per cent in 2006 to average 68,600 for the year, an all-time high. Total labour income increased by 2.8 per cent that year. The unemployment rate averaged 11.0 per cent in 2006, up from 10.8 per cent in 2005.

After a 0.8 per cent decline in 2005, manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 4.4 per cent to an all-time high of \$1,345.8 million in 2006. According to Statistics Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods increased from \$772.8 million in 2005 to \$786.0 million in 2006, an increase of 1.7 per cent.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2006.

The Canadian Economy

The Canadian economy performed well in 2006, benefiting from strong growth in consumer spending on goods and services, but limited by weak export growth. Annual growth of 2.7 per cent in real GDP for 2006 was slightly lower compared to last year's growth of 2.9 per cent. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP


growth between 2003 and 2006. After a strong expansion of 0.9 per cent in the first quarter of 2006, the economy grew by 0.5 per cent in each of the next two quarters. To finish the year real GDP increased by 0.4 per cent in the fourth quarter, keeping year-over-year growth steady at 2.7 per cent.

Final domestic demand continued to drive output led by *consumer spending* (up by \$41.4 billion or 5.4 per cent) followed by *gross fixed capital formation* (up by \$25.0 billion or 8.8 per cent) and *government expenditures* (up by \$18.4 billion or 7.0 per cent). High energy prices helped boost economy-wide incomes with much of these earnings reflected in a 6.1 per cent increase in *wages, salaries and supplementary labour income* as well as a 5.7 per cent increase in *corporate profits*. Partially offsetting economic growth were import gains (up 4.1 per cent), which outpaced exports (up 2.1 per cent).

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$760.4 billion in 2005 to \$801.8 billion in 2006, an increase of 5.4 per cent. Current dollar spending in 2006 on durable goods rose by 5.4 per cent, while expenditures on semi-durables and non-durables increased by 5.9 per cent and 3.9 per cent, respectively. Expenditures on services increased by 6.1 per cent that year.

The average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, fell from 2.2 per cent in 2005 to 2.0 per cent in 2006. The annual increase was largely the result of higher prices for *energy* (up by 5.1 per cent), *housing* (up by 3.6 per cent) and *transportation* (up by 2.7 per cent).

National employment rose from 16.2 million in 2005 to 16.5 million in 2006, an increase of 1.9 per cent.
Employment in the goods-producing sector fell by 16,500 jobs, while the service-providing sector expanded by 331,100 jobs. As shown in Diagram 2, job creation in 2006 was



strongest in the *construction industry* (4.9 per cent), in the *business and financial services* (4.8 per cent) and *primary industries* (4.1 per cent). Employment declined in the *manufacturing* sector. The national unemployment rate fell from 6.8 per cent in 2005 to 6.3 per cent in 2006.

According to the *United States Bureau of Economic Analysis*, the U.S. economy continued to show strong economic growth in 2006. The 3.3 per cent expansion was slightly higher than the 3.2 per cent recorded in 2005. Annualized growth was exceptionally strong in the first quarter of 2006 at 5.6 per cent, but slowed in the second and third quarters to an average of 2.3 per cent. This slowdown was largely the result of a sharp contraction in residential investment and lower inventory accumulation. Growth of the US economy in 2006 was supported by strong consumer spending, non-residential investment and an acceleration in exports.

Starting in September 2005 both Canada and the United States followed similar trends with respect to their monetary policy. Diagram 3 shows that prior to that date the *US Federal Reserve* exercised a tighter monetary policy position relative to

the more relaxed stance by the *Bank of Canada*. The Bank's latest interest rate announcement on March 6, 2007 left the overnight rate at 4.25 per cent. On March


21, 2007 the Federal Reserve announced it would maintain its policy rate at 5.25 per cent.

The Canadian dollar continued to appreciate against its US counterpart in 2006 with an average value of US\$0.88. The exchange rate peaked in May 2006 at US\$0.90. From a low of US\$0.62 in January 2002, the value of the Canadian dollar increased by 38.8 per cent to reach US\$0.87 in December 2006, a level not seen since 1992.

The Prince Edward Island Economy

Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada's preliminary estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 2.0 per cent in constant 1997 dollars in 2006, after experiencing 2.1 per cent growth in 2005. Diagram 4 shows growth in real





provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) since 1992. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2006 is estimated by Statistics Canada to be \$4,332 million. For more information about GDP, see Tables 34 to 40 (pages 60 to 65).

Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island rose by 2.2 per cent in 2006, compared to 3.2 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 1.4 per cent that year.

Energy inflation slowed from 15.7 per cent in 2005 to 4.9 per cent in 2006. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2000 and 2006. According to Statistics Canada.





gasoline sold for an average price of \$1.031 per litre in Charlottetown in 2006, an increase of 6.9 per cent from 2005. Heating oil sold for an average price \$0.776 per litre in 2006, up by 5.1 per cent from 2005. For more information see Tables 41 and 42 (pages 66 and 67).

Labour Force

Total employment on Prince Edward Island rose from 68,200 in 2005 to 68,600 in 2006, an increase of 0.6 per cent. This was the smallest employment growth since 1996. Employment in the goods-producing sector expanded by 6.2 per cent in 2006, while growth in the service-providing sector fell by 1.4 per cent.

Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 2,100 jobs were created in the construction, trade, business services and primary sectors in 2006. These gains were largely offset by 1,700 job losses in the other sectors of the economy. As a result the average unemployment rate





rose from 10.8 per cent in 2005 to 11.0 per cent in 2006. The labour force

participation rate rose slightly from 68.5 per cent in 2005 to 68.7 per cent in 2006. For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 20 (pages 48 to 50).

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose from \$3,597 million in 2005 to \$3,729 million in 2006, an increase of 3.7 per cent. Diagram 7 shows personal income

2006. The contributors to growth in 2006 were *labour income* (up by \$60 million), government transfers to persons (up by \$34 million), accrued net farm income (up by \$13 million) and net unincorporated non-farm business income (up by \$4 million).

Income derived from *interest, dividends and other investments* increased by 4.7 per cent to reach \$420.0 million in 2006. *Federal government transfers to persons* are estimated to be 4.8 per cent higher in 2006. *Employment Insurance* (E.I.) benefits paid on Prince Edward Island in 2006 were 8.4 per cent higher than a year earlier at \$218.3 million. The value of regular E.I. benefits rose by 9.1 per cent, while fishing benefits remained at par with 2005. Sickness benefits rose by 11.5 per cent in 2006, while maternity benefits grew by 10.5 per cent. For more information on personal income see Tables 22 to 29 (pages 52 to 56).

Population

For the second year in a row Prince Edward Island was the only province in Atlantic Canada to show positive population growth. On July 1, 2006, its population was estimated at 138,519, an increase of 343 persons or 0.2 per cent from 2005. This was well below the national average of 1.0 per cent. Between July 1, 2005, and June 30, 2006, the total number of Island births fell by 1.1 per cent to an estimated 1,393, while the number of deaths is estimated to be 1,231, an increase of 1.9 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to 162 during that period.

In addition to natural increase, preliminary data show that 232 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2005/06. This was the largest net

international migration since 1979. The following table illustrates positive migration flows to Prince Edward Island from all but two provinces/territories. The outflow to Alberta and British Columbia more than offset the inflow from the other jurisdictions.

The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 39.8 years in 2006. Furthermore, while 11 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 14.4 per cent in 2006.


According to the 2006 Census of Population count on May 16, 2006, there were 135,851 persons living on Prince Edward Island. Revised population estimates based on the 2006 Census will be published by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2008. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15 (pages 33 to 47).

Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

The value of Island manufacturing shipments rose strongly in 2006 to an all-time high of \$1,349.4 million, an increase of 3.9 per cent. Growth was mainly driven by fish processing and fabricated metal manufacturing activity.

Diagram 8 shows the distribution of manufacturing shipments. Total food manufacturing was valued at \$847.9 million in 2006, an increase of \$55.0 million or 6.9 per cent compared to 2005. The value of processed fish products increased by



\$82.5 million or 32.8 per cent to \$334.2 million, while other processed food products, at \$513.7 million, fell by \$27.5 million or 5.1 per cent.

Shipments of non-food manufacturing totaled \$501.5 million in 2006, a decrease of \$3.7 million or -0.7 per cent from 2005. The single largest contributor was *fabricated metal manufacturing*, which increased from \$18.3 million in 2005 to \$21.5 million in 2006, up by 17.6 per cent. Aerospace products, valued at \$149.2 million, made up 30 per cent of total non-food manufactures in 2006. Other manufacturing was valued at \$124.9 million, up by \$5.7 million or 4.8 per cent compared to 2005. For more information on the manufacturing sector see Tables 79 and 80 (pages 89 and 90).

In 2005 the manufacturing sector provided 10 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the retail trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector reached an all-time high of 6,800.

Exports

According to Statistics Canada, the total value of exported goods rose slightly from \$772.8 million in 2005 to \$786.0 million in 2006, an increase of 1.7 per cent. Exports of agriculture and fishing products made up 66.5 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2006. Its value rose from \$501.0 million in 2005 to \$522.6 million in 2006, an increase of 4.3 per cent. Other Island exports, valued at \$263.4 million, included \$82.5 million in machinery and equipment (down by 6.0 per cent from 2005), \$18.4 million in industrial goods (down by 21.4 per cent) and \$152.1 million in other Island-made products (down by 0.9 per cent). The value of Island forestry product shipments fell from \$16.5 million in 2005 to \$10.4 million in 2006, a decline of 37.0 per cent. For more export data see Tables 47 and 48 (page 72).

Agriculture

Market conditions in the agricultural sector on Prince Edward Island improved in 2006 and cash receipts returned to a more normal level. Total farm cash receipts for Prince Edward Island reached \$379.8 million that year, 3.2 per cent higher than in 2005. The growth in total receipts in 2006 was mainly the result of record-high crop receipts. Table 2 shows the value of farm cash receipts by major commodity from 1999 to 2006.



After several years of low returns, market prices for potatoes improved in 2006, largely as a result of the voluntary reduction in the seeded acreage implemented in parts of Canada and the USA in the last two years. On Prince Edward Island, farmers reduced their planted area from 106,000 acres in 2004 to 97,000 acres in 2006. This helped lift potato prices resulting in increased receipts of 21.6 per cent to a record value of \$201.4 million. However, total livestock receipts fell by 3.7 per cent to \$121.1 million, mainly the result of lower hog receipts (down by \$3.9 million or 14.6 per cent) and declining cattle receipts (down by \$1.3 million or 6.0 per cent). Government support payments to farm operators fell by 53.5 per cent to \$21.3 million in 2006. For more data see Tables 57 to 69 (pages 78 to 84).

Retail Trade

Diagram 9 shows that, following five years of declining growth, the upward trend in retail sales, which started in 2005, continued into 2006. Sales were valued at \$1,486.6 million, up by 4.1 per cent from the previous year. Growth was driven by increased

spending at gasoline stations, supermarkets, home centres and hardware stores, but was limited by reduced spending at specialized building materials and garden stores and furniture stores. Increased sales at used car dealerships together with higher sales of new motor vehicles contributed to overall growth in the retail sector in 2006. That year 4,933 new vehicles (up by 1.8 per cent from 2005) were sold with a total value of \$130.0 million (up 2.9 per cent from 2005). Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector rose by 4.2 per cent to 9,900 people in 2006, making it the largest private sector employer in the province. 
Fisheries and Forestry

The *Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Aquaculture* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2006 rose by 1.5 per cent to \$166.6 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 92.6 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Lobster landings increased from 18.5 million lbs. to 21.5 million lbs, an increase of 16.2 per cent, but landings of other crustaceans and molluscs fell by 2.4 per cent in 2006. Lobster prices dropped by 5.4 per cent to \$5.28/lb., while prices for other crustaceans and molluscs fell on average by 15 per cent from 2005.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 13.6 per cent lower than last year. Fish prices decreased in 2006 for most species except for cod (up by 3.1 per cent to 53.8 cents/lb.) and smelts (up by 33.1 per cent to 51.9 cents/lb.) The harvesting of sea plants rose by 19.8 per cent with a 33.0 per cent increase in price. For more data on fisheries see Tables 71 to 75 (pages 85 to 87).

The *P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry* estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island increased from 633,000 cubic

metres in 2005 to 649,000 cubic metres in 2006, an increase of 2.6 per cent. During the last 10 years total wood production increased by an average of 0.9 per cent per year. Diagram 10 shows hardwood and softwood production since 1996.

The volume of primary forest product shipments fell by 0.6 per cent, from 662,000 cubic metres in 2005 to 658,000 cubic metres in 2006. Industrial wood production decreased by 6.0 per cent in 2006, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips expanded by 3.7 per cent. According to Statistics Canada, wood industry shipments were valued at \$45.7 million in 2006, down 7.1 per cent from 2005. For more data see Table 70 (page 85).


Tourism

The *P.E.I. Department of Tourism* estimated that a total of 1.38 million tourists visited the Island in 2006, about the same as in 2005. Traffic on the Confederation Bridge and aboard the Northumberland Ferries, which comprises the vast majority of tourist traffic, was down slightly from 2005. Air traffic, however, increased by about 20 per cent, driven largely by increased volumes on direct flights to Charlottetown. The department estimates that year-round resident and non-resident tourist expenditures totaled \$334.1 million in 2006, an increase of 3.0 per cent from last year. External pressures affecting Atlantic Canada's tourism industry, such as the high value of the Canadian dollar and recently introduced Unites States passport requirements, may limit growth in 2007.

Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$788.0 million in 2006, an increase of 3.8 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment rose from \$147.9 million in 2005 to \$186.0 million in 2006, an increase of 25.8 per cent, while private sector investment fell by 1.5 per cent, from \$610.9 million in 2005 to \$602.0 million in 2006. construction, whereas the *other starts* category (consisting mainly of apartment building construction) rose by 40.2 per cent from 117 units in 2005 to 164 units in 2006.

Non-residential construction activity was a key economic driver in 2006. According to Statistics Canada, investment in non-residential construction on Prince Edward Island was valued at \$145.7 million, an increase of 18.7 per cent from 2005. Major non-residential construction projects in 2006 included the new Jean Canfield Federal building and various major projects on the University of P.E.I. campus.

Transportation

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. According to *P.E.I.* Department of Transportation and Public Works estimates, about 1.5 million vehicles crossed the privately owned Confederation Bridge in both directions in 2006, at par with traffic data in 2005. Bridge traffic during the months of January and February 2006 was up by 2.8 per cent from 2005, while crossings during July and August 2006 decreased by 6.8 per cent compared the same period last year.

The number of passengers taking the *Northumberland Ferries Ltd.* service between Wood Islands, P.E.I. and Caribou, N.S. rose from 393,172 in 2005 to 398,990 in 2006, an increase of 1.5 per cent. At the same time 165,332 vehicles of all kinds were transported, compared to 166,384 in 2005 for a decrease of 0.6 per cent.

For three consecutive years, the total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport has been on the increase. In 2006, 113,662 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 20.9 per cent from 2005), while 111,178 people left the province by air (up by 16.3 per cent). Total air passenger traffic was up by 18.6 per cent compared to 2005.

In 2006 the volume of product received at Island seaports (with the exception of the Charlottetown port), including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 220,307 metric tonnes, down by 42.0 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 63,790 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly pulpwood and firewood, were shipped from Summerside and Georgetown ports. More transportation data can be found in Tables 89 and 90 (pages 95 and 96).

The Public Service Sector

According to Statistics Canada, in 2006 the public service sector, comprising *education*, *health and social services* and *public administration*, accounted for 26.6 per cent of the Island economy and 33.1 per cent of total employment. Real public sector GDP in chained 1997 dollars rose by 0.7 per cent in 2006, slightly lower than the 1.3 per cent growth recorded in 2005.


Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 2.2 per cent in 2006. *Education services* experienced a job loss of 0.8 per cent that year, while employment in the *health and social services* sector fell by 6.3 per cent.

Provincial Finance

The Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,170.0 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2005/06, almost 5.0 per cent higher than in FY 2004/05. Provincial tax revenues were valued at \$711.1 million that year, an increase of 7.9 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 38.0 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2005/06 compared to 40.2 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments decreased by 1.4 per cent to value \$276.6 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 14.4 per cent to total \$125.4 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 1.7 per cent to reach \$1,169.3 million.

The provincial *Public Accounts* indicate that the surplus on the Operating Fund for FY 2005/06 was \$680,000, a major improvement over last year's deficit of \$33.6 million.

As of March 31, 2006, the provincial net debt was \$1,292 million, up 1.3 per cent from 2005. Diagram 12 shows Prince Edward Island's ranking of its net financial debt per capita among the provinces in FY 2004/05. 











PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND FISHING DISTRICTS


