


A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation," because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ⁽¹⁾ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties – Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

Economic Review 2008

Overview

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 0.5 per cent in 2008. This compares to growth of 2.7 per cent in 2007. The Prince Edward Island economy grew by 0.9 per cent in 2008 following two years of 2.4 per cent growth. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2008 is estimated to be \$4,716 million.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP by industry indicate that in 2008 the leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2002 chained prices): *public administration* (up by \$13.1 million or 2.8 per cent), *finance, insurance and real estate* (up by \$9.3 million or 1.4 per cent), *education services* (up by \$7.7 million or 3.1 per cent) and *retail trade* (up by \$7.7 million or 2.9 per cent). Sectors showing the largest declines were *manufacturing* (down by \$10.8 million or 2.4 per cent) and *agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting* (down by \$4.9 million or 1.5 per cent).

The general rise in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 3.4 per cent in 2008. Leading factors contributing to this rise were higher prices for *energy* (up by 16.9 per cent), *shelter* (up by 7.9 per cent) and *food* (up by 3.9 per cent). In Canada prices increased by 2.3 per cent in 2008.


Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.3 per cent in 2008 to average 70,200 for the year. Total labour income increased by 3.9 per cent that year. The unemployment rate averaged 10.8 per cent in 2008, up from 10.3 per cent in 2007.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island declined by 3.8 per cent to \$1,374.1 million in 2008, from \$1,428.6 in 2007. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rebounded from a 4.2 per cent decrease in 2007, increasing by 9.4 per cent in 2008 to \$878.2 million.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2008.

The Canadian Economy

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy grew by 0.5 per cent in 2008. This is substantially lower than the 2.7 per cent growth witnessed in 2007. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2005 and 2008.

After contracting by 0.2 per


cent in the first quarter of 2008, the economy grew by 0.1 per cent in the second quarter, followed by 0.2 per cent in the third quarter. To finish the year, real GDP decreased by 0.8 per cent in the fourth quarter, making the year-over-year growth 0.5 per cent.

Final domestic demand continued to drive output led by *consumer spending* (up by \$40.2 billion or 4.7 per cent) followed by *government expenditures* (up by \$17.6 billion or 5.9 per cent) and *gross fixed capital formation* (up by \$14.8 billion or 4.3 per cent). Partially offsetting economic growth were import gains (up 6.1 per cent), which outpaced exports (up 5.4 per cent).

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$852.8 billion in 2007 to \$893.0 billion in 2008, an increase of 4.7 per cent. Current dollar spending in 2008 on durable goods rose by 0.2 per cent, while expenditures on semi-durables and non-durables increased by 2.0 per cent and 5.6 per cent, respectively. Expenditures on services increased by 5.8 per cent that year.

The average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, rose from 2.2 per cent in 2007 to 2.3 per cent in 2008. The annual increase was largely the result of higher prices for *energy* (up by 9.9 per cent), *housing* (up by 4.4 per cent) and *food* (up by 3.5 per cent).

National employment rose from 16.9 million in 2007 to 17.1 million in 2008, an increase of 1.5 per cent. Employment in the goods-producing sector grew by 28,300 jobs, while the service providing sector expanded by 231,000 jobs. As shown in Diagram 2, job creation in 2008 was strongest in the *construction industry* (8.7 per cent), *transportation and warehousing* (4.2 per cent) and *heath*, *education*, *and public administration* (3.3 per cent). Employment declined in the *manufacturing* sector for the fourth straight year. The national unemployment rate rose slightly from 6.0 per cent in 2007 to 6.1 per cent in 2008.


The American Economy

The American economy continues to face numerous difficulties, and is now widely believed to have been in a recession since Q4 2007. Real GDP growth in the United States has been trending downward for several years, with GDP growth for 2008 at 1.1 per cent, as compared to 2.0 per cent in 2007. GDP growth for the last two quarters of 2008 has been negative, with a fourth quarter contraction of 6.3 per cent at an annual rate. The Federal Reserve expects a GDP contraction in the American economy to occur in 2009-2010 of between 0.5 and 1.3 per cent.

With the spread of the subprime mortgage situation into broader American financial markets, then into global financial markets, and finally into the real economy, in 2008 the United States found itself in a position of a mounting federal deficit, rising unemployment, and a continually weakening economic situation. Falling housing prices have contributed to a rising default rate on mortgages, as 4.3 per cent of U.S. mortgages were in arrears. The unemployment rate increased steadily over this time period, from a low of 4.8 per cent in February 2008, to finish the year at 7.2 per cent in December 2008. That trend continued into the early months of 2009.


In an attempt to combat this situation, the United States Government passed several rounds of economic stimulus, the latest totaling \$787 billion. In an effort to provide liquidity to credit markets, and ease lending, the United States Federal Reserve lowered the federal funds rate to essentially zero.

The key overnight rate set by the Bank of Canada held steady through the end of 2006 and most of 2007 at 4.25 per cent. This rate was lowered to 4.0 per cent in January of 2008, lowered again in March 2008 to 3.5 per cent, and then to 3.0 per cent in April 2008, where it held for six months. Beginning in October 2008, however, the Bank of Canada began aggressively cutting its overnight lending rat in an effort to facilitate credit and alleviate some of the downturn in the economy. Between January 2008 and March 2009, the overnight lending rate had been cut by 350 basis points, to sit at 0.5 per cent at the end of March 2009. As can be seen in diagram 3, interest rates in both Canada and the United States have been cut dramatically since the fall of 2007.


Statistics Canada's preliminary estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 0.9 per cent in chained 2002 dollars in 2008, after experiencing 2.4 per cent growth in 2006 and 2007. Diagram 4 shows growth in real provincial Gross Domestic Product

(GDP) since 1994. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2008 is estimated by Statistics Canada to be \$4,716 million. For more information about GDP see Tables 34 to 40 (pages 58 to 64).

Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island rose by 3.4 per cent in 2008, compared to 2.3 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 0.6 per cent that year.

Energy inflation rose dramatically from 2.7 per cent in 2007 to 16.9 per cent in 2008. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2001 and 2008. The price of gasoline and heating oil on P.E.I.


peaked in July 2008 at \$1.412 per litre and \$1.275 per litre respectively. Fuel prices steadily declined during the final 5 months of the year, reaching the lowest levels of the year in December at \$0.72 per litre for gasoline and \$0.701 for heating fuel. According to *Statistics Canada*, gasoline sold for an average price of \$1.145 per litre in Charlottetown in 2008, an increase of 9.9 per cent from 2007. Heating oil sold for an average price \$1.023 cents per litre in 2008, up by 29.0 per cent from 2007. This compares with averages of \$1.087 per litre for gasoline and \$1.13 per litre for heating fuel in the Ottawa area. Labour Force

Total employment on Prince Edward Island rose 1.3 per cent from 69,300 in 2007 to an all time high of 70,200 in 2008. Employment in the goods-producing sector fell by 1.7 per cent in 2008, while employment

in the service providing sector grew by 2.5 per cent.

Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 2,000 jobs were created in the construction, business and financial services, transportation and warehousing, health, education and public administration industries in 2008. The remaining sectors



accounted for a loss of 1,400 jobs. The labour force participation rate rose slightly from 68.2 per cent in 2007 to 68.7 per cent in 2008. As a result the average unemployment rate rose from 10.3 per cent in 2007 to 10.8 per cent in 2008. For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 20 (pages 46 to 48).

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose 3.4 per cent to reach \$4,049 million in 2008. Diagram 7 shows personal income growth from 1998 to 2008. The contributors to growth in 2008 were *labour income* (up by \$91 million),

government transfers to persons (up by \$29 million), net unincorporated non-farm business income (up by \$14 million), and interest, dividends and other investments (up by \$10 million).

Employment Insurance (E.I.) benefits paid on Prince Edward Island in 2008 were 0.5 per cent lower than a year earlier at \$221.1 million. The value of regular E.I. benefits remained relatively steady, rising by just 0.03 per cent. Fishing benefits decreased by 3.0 per cent. Sickness benefits rose by 8.7 per cent in 2008, while maternity benefits grew by 11.8 per cent. For more information on personal income see Tables 22 to 33 (pages 50 to 57).

Population

On July 1, 2008, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 139,818, an increase of 1,700 persons or 1.23 per cent from 2007. This was the fastest rate of growth east of Saskatchewan and slightly higher than the national growth of 1.17 per cent. Preliminary data show that 1,281 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2007/08 while 65 emigrants left the Island, resulting in a new high of 1,205 for net international migration. Net interprovincial migration was 42, with Alberta and Ontario being the top two destinations. Between July 1, 2007 and June 30, 2008 the total number of Island births increased slightly by 0.5 per cent to an estimated 1,420. The number of deaths is estimated to be 1,206, an increase of 2.1 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to 232 during that period.

The following table illustrates interprovincial migration flows to and from Prince Edward Island.


The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 41.3 years in 2008. Furthermore, while 11 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 15.1 per cent in 2008.

According to the 2006 Census of Population count on May 16, 2006 there were 135,851 persons living on Prince Edward Island. Revised population estimates based on the 2006 Census were published by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2008. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15 (pages 31 to 45).

Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2003 to 2008. Total shipments saw a drop of \$52.8 million (3.7 per cent) in 2008, to a value of \$1,375.9 million. The largest declines occurred in

food manufacturing (down 7.4 per cent) and chemicals (down 28.2 per cent). However, these losses were offset in part by increases in transportation equipment manufacturing (up 10.5 per cent) and aerospace product and parts manufacturing (up 5.0 per cent). In 2008 employment in the manufacturing sector fell by 9.0 per cent. However, it still provided 8.7 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the retail trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector was 6,100.

Exports

According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods rose from \$802.7 million in 2007 to \$878.2 million in 2008, an decrease of 4.2 per cent. Exports of agriculture and fishing products made up 61.4 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2008. Its value rose from \$512.9 million in 2007 to \$521.1 million in 2008, an increase of 1.6 per cent. Other Island exports, valued at \$327.5 million, included \$191.7 million in machinery and equipment (up by 58.7 per cent from 2007), \$18.3 million in industrial goods (up by 30.7 per cent) and \$117.5 million in other Island-made products (down by 1.6 per cent). The value of Island forestry product exports fell from \$6.3 million in 2007 to \$1.7 million in 2008, a decline of 73.0 per cent. For more export data see Tables 47 and 48 (page 71).

Agriculture

Prince Edward Island's farm cash receipts for 2008 totaled \$391.9 million. As can be seen in Table 2, total farm cash receipts rose by 1.1 per cent over 2007. Crop receipts rose by 1.9 per cent. Heavy rains in the fall resulted in a 10.5 per cent decline in potato production, however higher prices pushed potato receipts to \$200.9 million, an increase of 1.5 per cent for the year. Receipts for other crops increased by 4.0 per cent. Livestock receipts fell by 6.1 per cent, with the largest decline occurring in hog receipts (25.8 per cent). Cattle receipts fell by 13.5 per cent and dairy receipts fell by 1.4 per cent.



Retail Trade

Diagram 9 shows that the retail sales growth slowed for the first time since 2004. However, Prince Edward Island still saw moderate growth in retail sales at 5.6 per cent, exceeding the national growth rate of 3.4 per cent. Sales were valued at \$1,720.6 million.

Higher prices for gasoline and food were reflected in retail sales as growth was driven by increased spending at gasoline stations (up \$47.3 million) and supermarkets (up \$15.1 million). Sales were also up at used car dealers (up \$6.3 million), however reduced spending at new car dealers (down \$8.0 million) brought total spending at all car dealers down by \$1.9 million.² New vehicle sales increased by 5,504 vehicles (up by 3.8 per cent from 2007) with a total value of \$136.7 million (down 1.4 per cent). Spending also saw a reduction at sporting goods, hobby, music and bookstores (down \$3.1 million) and miscellaneous store retailers (down \$2.7 million). Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector declined by 1.0 per cent to 10,400 people in 2008, but still remained the largest private sector employer in the province. 
Fisheries and Forestry

The Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Rural Development estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2008 fell by 8.0 per cent to \$154.2 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 93.3 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Lobster landings rose by 8.8 per cent to reach 21.9 million lbs. However, reduced prices resulted in a decrease of 7.3 per cent in the value of lobster landings, which was estimated to be \$100.7 million. Lobster prices fell by 14.8 per cent to \$4.60/lb. Landings of other crustaceans and molluscs fell by 1.6 per cent in 2008.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 8.9 per cent lower than last year. Prices increased in 2008 for cod (up by 34.0 per cent to 67.0 cents/lb.), rock crab (up by 50.0 per cent to 37.5 cents/lb.) and hake (up by 11.1 per cent to 25.0 cents/lb.). Lower prices were seen for smelts (down by 10.7 per cent to 40.0 cents/lb.), oysters (down by 7.4 per cent to \$1/lb.) and snow crab (down by 7.0 per cent to \$2/lb.). The harvesting of sea plants fell by 60.9 per cent. For more data on fisheries see Tables 71 to 75 (pages 84 to 86).

The P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island decreased from 530,000 cubic metres in 2007 to 350,000 cubic metres in 2008, a decrease of 34.0 per cent. Diagram 10 shows wood production since 2001.

Industrial wood production decreased by 67.2 per cent in 2008, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips fell by 6.8 per cent. For more data see Table 70 (page 84).

Tourism

According to the *P.E.I. Department of Tourism*, the number of tourists who visited the Island in 2008 was down by 0.6 per cent as compared to 2007. All of the decline was due to a decrease in international tourists, most likely caused by high gas prices and a high Canadian dollar. The number of Canadian tourists to P.E.I. increased by 0.6 per cent. Total air traffic increased by 11.5 per cent, while bridge and ferry traffic decreased by 11.0 per cent and 5.6 per cent respectively. Occupancy rates province wide were up 0.9 percentage points to reach 41.2 per cent for 2008. For more information on tourism, see tables 76 to 78 (pages 87 and 88).


Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$957.5 million in 2008, an increase of 0.8 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment increased from \$170.3 million in 2007 to \$203.8 million in 2008, an increase of 19.7 per cent, while private sector investment fell by 3.3 per cent, from \$779.6 million in 2007 to \$753.8 million in 2008.

According to Statistics Canada, investment in non-residential construction on Prince Edward Island was valued at \$94.8 million, an increase of 1.0 per cent from 2007. Non-

residential building permits almost doubled, increasing by 98.3 per cent in 2008. The majority of this increase came from institutional permits, and was largely a result of the refurbishment done to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, as well as the associated building for the 2009 Canada Summer Games. Commercial building permits also increased in 2008.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 712 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2008, a decrease of 5.1 per cent from 2007. As seen in Diagram 11, the decrease was due to decreases in both single and semi-detached home construction, whereas

the *other starts* category (consisting mainly of apartment building construction) increased by 71.4 per cent from 77 units in 2007 to 132 units in 2008.

Transportation

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. For five consecutive years, the total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport has been on the increase. In 2008, 139,405 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 9.6 per cent from 2007), while 142,980 people left the province by air (up by 13.5 per cent). Total air passenger traffic was up by 11.5 per cent compared to 2007.

In 2008 the volume of product received at Island seaports, including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 967,530 metric tonnes, up by 123.6 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 24,514 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly potatoes, pulpwood and firewood, were shipped from Summerside and Georgetown ports. More transportation data can be found in Tables 89 to 90 (pages 94 and 95).

The Public Service Sector

According to Statistics Canada, in 2008 the public service sector, comprising *education*, *health* & *social services* and *public administration*, accounted for 28.7 per cent of the Island economy and 29.8 per cent of total employment. Real public sector GDP in chained 2002 dollars rose by 2.3 per cent in 2008 and by 1.8 per cent in 2007.


Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 1.5 per cent in 2008. Employment in the *health and social services* sector decreased by 0.4 per cent.

Provincial Finance

The Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,302.4 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2007/08, 5.8 per cent higher than in FY 2006/07. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$767.7 million that year, an increase of 3.9 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 39.8 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2007/08 compared to 38.6 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 0.9 per cent to value \$294.0 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 3.6 per cent to total \$137.6 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 8.2 per cent to reach \$1,306 million.

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations shows a deficit for FY 2007/08 in the amount of \$3.6 million. As of March 31, 2008 the provincial net debt was

\$1,347.1 million, up 2.7 per cent from 2007. Diagram 12 shows Prince Edward Island's ranking of its net financial debt per capita among the provinces in FY 2006/07. More data on the government sector can be found at Tables 107 to 112 (pages 107 to 112).


















