



A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ¹ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

Provincial Flag The design of the Prince Edward Island Flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white. The official flag was established March 24, 1964.

Provincial Bird

During the 1977 session of the PEI Legislative Assembly, the Blue Jay was officially named the provincial bird. It was chosen after a provincewide public vote held during Environment Week in 1976. Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.



Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. Economic Review 2009

Overview

Statistics Canada estimates that GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 0.6 per cent in 2009. Leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2002 chained prices): finance, insurance and real estate (up by \$18.1 million or 2.6 per cent), public administration (up by \$5.6 million or 1.2 per cent), education services (up by \$5.3 million or 2.1 per cent), and retail trade (up by \$3.5 million or 1.2 per cent). Sectors showing the largest declines were wholesale trade (down by \$6.7 million or 6.1 per cent) and Accommodation and Food Services (down by \$3.4 million or 2.7 per cent).

The change in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was -0.2 per cent in 2009. Leading factors contributing to this were lower prices for *energy* (down by 16.1 per cent) and *shelter* (down by 4.0 per cent). The price of *food* increased by 5.5 per cent. In Canada, prices increased by 0.3 per cent in 2009.


Employment on Prince Edward Island declined by 1.0 per cent in 2009 to average 69,500 for the year. Total labour income increased by 4.4 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 12.0 per cent in 2009, up from 10.8 per cent in 2008. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 2.8 per cent in 2009.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island declined by 3.3 per cent to \$1,330.7 million in 2009, down from \$1,376.1 in 2008. According to Industry Canada, after seeing a 10.6 per cent increase in 2008, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods fell by 2.0 per cent in 2009 to \$861.0 million.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2009.

The Canadian Economy

The Canadian economy emerged from recession in the third quarter of 2009, after three quarters of negative economic growth beginning in the fourth quarter of 2008. GDP growth in the third quarter was 0.2 per cent, while growth in the fourth quarter advanced to 1.2 per cent, the fastest quarterly growth in a decade.


Final domestic demand declined by 0.4 per cent in 2009. *Consumer spending* was up by \$5.5 billion (0.6 per cent) and *government expenditures* also increased by \$18.1 billion (5.8 per cent). Offsetting these increased were declines in total investment (down \$47.7 billion or 12.8 per cent) and *Net Exports*. Imports (down by 13.6 per cent) continued to outpace exports (down 22.1 per cent).

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$891.2 billion in 2008 to \$896.7 billion in 2009, an increase of 0.6 per cent. This was mainly due to a 3.0 per cent increase in expenditures on services. Current dollar spending in 2009 on durable goods fell by 5.3 per cent, while expenditures on semi-durables and non-durables decreased by 2.5 per cent and 0.7 per cent, respectively.

Consumer Prices increased marginally in 2009, with the all-items consumer price index increasing 0.3 per cent. On average, prices for food increased 4.9 per cent, while energy prices declined 13.5 per cent over this time period. Core inflation, (excluding food and energy), increased 1.1 per cent in 2009.

Employment in Canada declined by an average of 276,900 jobs, or 1.6 per cent in 2009. The majority of these employment losses occurred in the first six months of the year, and were largely concentrated in the manufacturing sector in Ontario. This resulted in the unemployment rate averaging 8.3 per cent in 2009, an increase of 2.2 percentage points over 2008.

Job losses occurred primarily in the goods-producing sector, down 7.1 per cent, while the service sector remained essentially flat, up 0.1 per cent. Losses were particularly acute in manufacturing, down 9.1 per cent, construction, down 5.7 per cent, and primary industries, down 4.6 per cent. Modest gains occurred in other services, up 3.6 per cent, and Health, Education, and Public Administration, up 1.3 per cent.




The American Economy

The American economy emerged from recession in the third quarter of 2009. Real GDP in that quarter grew by 2.2 per cent at an annualized rate. Estimates for Q4 show GDP growth of 5.9 per cent at an annualized rate. Gains in GDP came from exports, personal consumption expenditures, and private inventory investments. During this time imports also increased, subtracting from GDP. From the peak to the trough of this recession, GDP declined 3.8 per cent.


On average, there were 14.3 million Americans unemployed in 2009, up from 8.9 million in 2008. The unemployment rate in the U.S. for 2009 was 9.3 per cent, up 3.5 percentage points from 2008 and the highest annual unemployment rate since 1983.

Though growth began to re-emerge in the American economy in the final months of 2009, final domestic demand remained weak. The Federal Reserve continued to hold interest rates low throughout the year. Below is a graph detailing the target for the overnight rate for both the United States and Canada. After cutting rates rapidly during the beginning of the recession, the overnight rate has held steady at 0.25 per cent in the United States throughout all of 2009. A similar pattern can be observed for Canada. For more information on interest rates, see table 38 (page 60).

statistics Canada's preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 0.6 per cent in chained 2002 dollars in 2009, just slightly less than the 0.7 per cent growth seen in 2008. Diagram 4 shows growth in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by Industry since 1998.



Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island declined by 0.2 per cent in 2009, compared to a rise of 0.3 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 2.1 per cent in 2009.

Energy prices fell back to nearly 2007 levels in 2009. Following a rise of 16.9 per cent in 2008, energy prices fell 16.1 per cent in 2009. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between

2002 and 2009. While still remaining below 2008 levels, gasoline prices increased steadily during the first half of 2009, rising from \$0.691 per litre in January to \$1.035 per litre by June (regular self-serve). The price for gasoline peaked at \$1.047 in November, before falling to \$0.961 by the end of the year. The price of home heating oil in 2009 ranged from \$0.631 per litre in March to \$0.798 per litre in November, ending the year at \$0.765 per litre. Labour Force

The annual average of total employment on Prince Edward Island declined by 1.0 per cent from 70,200 in 2008 to 69,500 in 2009. However, with the exception of declines in July and August, employment steadily increased in 2009, reaching an all time high of 71,400 in November. Employment in the goods-producing sector shrank by 1.7 per cent in 2009, while employment in the service providing sector declined by 0.9 per cent.





Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 1,600 jobs were created in construction, primary industries, accommodation and food services, health, education and public administration and other services in 2009. The remaining sectors accounted for a loss of

2,000 jobs.³ The labour force participation rate fell slightly from 68.7 per cent in 2008 to 68.1 per cent in 2009. The average unemployment rate rose for the second straight year, going from 10.8 per cent in 2008 to 12.0 per cent in 2009. Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours shows that employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 2.8 per cent in 2009, mostly due to increases in Health and Social Services, Construction and Manufacturing. Declines were seen in the Trade sector, Transportation and Warehousing and Administrative Support. For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 20 (pages 44 to 46).

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 4.4 per cent to reach \$2,543 million in 2009. Diagram 7 shows labour income growth from 1999 to 2009. The major contributors to growth in 2009 were in *public administration* (up by 6.4 per cent), *health care and social assistance* (up by 6.3 per cent), and

professional and personal services (up by 6.2 per cent).

Employment Insurance (E.I.) benefits paid on Prince Edward Island in 2009 were 9.1 per cent higher than a year earlier at \$241.2 million. The value of regular E.I. benefits rose by 12.8 per cent. Fishing benefits decreased by 1.3 per cent. Sickness benefits rose by 13.6 per cent in 2009, while maternity benefits grew by 0.9 per cent. Population

On July 1, 2009, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 140,985, an increase of 1,534 persons or 1.1 per cent from 2008. This was the highest annual rate of growth for P.E.I. since 1984 and just slightly lower than the national growth of 1.2 per cent. Preliminary data show that 1,793 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2008/09 while 37 emigrants left the Island, resulting in a new high of 1,715 for net international migration. Net interprovincial migration was -559, with Ontario, Alberta, and Nova Scotia being the top destinations of Islanders leaving for other provinces. Between July 1, 2008 and June 30, 2009 the total number of Island births increased slightly by 1.0 per cent to an estimated 1,402. The number of deaths is estimated to be 1,250, an increase of 2.7 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to 152 during that period.

The following table illustrates interprovincial migration flows to and from Prince Edward Island.


The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 41.7 years in 2009. Furthermore, while 11 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 15.3 per cent in 2009.

According to the 2006 Census of Population count on May 16, 2006 there were 135,851 persons living on Prince Edward Island. Revised population estimates based on the 2006 Census were published by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2009. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15 (pages 29 to 43).

Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2004 to 2009. Total shipments declined for a second straight year in 2009, falling \$45 million (3.3 per cent), to a value of



\$1,331 million. The largest decline occurred in food manufacturing (down 14.2 per cent). Chemical manufacturing rebounded from a loss in 2008, showing a 40.2 per cent gain in 2009. Transportation equipment manufacturing also increased in 2009 (up 14.4 per cent). In 2009 employment in the manufacturing sector fell by 9.8 per cent. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector was 5,500.

Exports


According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods fell from \$878.1 million in 2008 to \$861.0 million in 2009, a decrease of 2.0 per cent. Exports of agriculture and fishing products made up 58.5 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2009. Its value fell from \$521.1 million in 2008 to \$487.2 million in 2009, a decrease of 6.5 per cent. Other Island exports, valued at \$344.0 million, included \$209.0 million in machinery and equipment (up by 9.0 per cent from 2008), \$21.1 million in industrial goods (up by 15.3 per cent) and \$114.0 million in other Island-made products (down by 2.9 per cent). The value of Island forestry product exports fell dramatically for the second consecutive year, falling from \$1.7 million in 2008 to \$0.8 million in 2009, a decline of 52.9 per cent and 87.3 per cent over 2 years. Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2009 totaled \$395.7 million, an increase of 0.9 per cent over 2008. This compares to a decrease of 3.7 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts totaled \$241.8 million, an increase of 0.6 per cent over 2008, led largely by a 3.1 per cent increase in potato receipts. Total livestock receipts decreased 1.2 per cent. The decline was mainly due to a 34.0 per cent decrease in hog receipts. Cattle receipts fell slightly by 0.5 per cent. Dairy receipts rebounded after falling slightly in 2008, gaining 6.0 per cent.

Retail Trade

gasoline stations declined by 13.5 per

cent (down \$33.8 million). Sales were also down at building material and garden equipment stores (down 9.4 per cent or \$17.1 million). Spending was down slightly at new car dealers (down \$1.7 million), however used car dealers saw an increase of 1.4 per cent (up \$1.1 million). Total spending at all car dealers was down by \$0.6 million. New vehicle sales decreased by 218 vehicles (down 4.0 per cent from 2008) with a total of 5,286 vehicles sold. However, the value of new vehicles sold was \$144.7 million (up 5.8 per cent). Higher food prices in 2009 were reflected in increased sales at supermarkets (up 3.1 per cent). Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector declined by 3.8 per cent to 10,000 people in 2009, but still remained the largest private sector employer in the province. Fisheries and Forestry

The *Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Rural Development* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2009 fell by 20.9 per cent to \$237.3 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 91.8 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Lobster landings rose by 2.1 per cent to reach 22.4 million pounds. However, continued low prices resulted in a decrease of 28.6 per cent in the value of lobster landings, which was estimated to be \$71.9 million. Lobster prices fell by 32.0 per cent to \$3.13/lb. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs fell by 5.2 per cent in 2009.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 12.2 per cent higher than last year, reaching 36.9 million pounds. Prices increased in 2009 for hake (up by 16.0 per cent to 29.0 cents/lb.), herring (up by 13.8 per cent to 12.4 cents/lb.), rock crab (up by 1.1 per cent to 37.8 cents/lb.) and oysters (up by 1.0 per cent to \$1.01/lb.). Lower prices were seen for cod (down by 13.4 per cent to 58.0 cents/lb.), snow crab (down by 12.5 per cent to \$1.75/lb.) smelts (down by 3.3 per cent to 38.7 cents/lb.) and mackerel (down by 2.2 per cent to 35.2 cents/lb.). The *P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry* estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island decreased from 350,000 cubic metres in 2008 to 325,000 cubic metres in 2009, a decrease of 7.1 per cent. Diagram 10 shows wood production since 2002.

Industrial wood production decreased by 32.1 per cent in 2009, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips remained steady. For more data see Table 70 (page 82).

Tourism

Prince Edward Island's tourism industry faced some challenges in 2009. The Canada Summer Games in August 2009, the 50th anniversary of the Gold Cup and Saucer, as well as a number of conventions, festivals and events including the inaugural Cavendish Beach Music Festival helped to support the tourism sector through a difficult year. Cruise ship traffic was strong in 2009, with forty-one ships visiting the Island, bringing 63,073 visitors. This is an increase of 10 per cent, and 14 per cent respectively over 2008 levels. The occupancy rate declined 0.6 per cent in 2009, while the number of room-nights sold declined 3.6 per cent. Bridge traffic was up 9.1 per cent in 2009, while both air and ferry traffic declined 1.2 per cent, and 3.0 per cent respectively. Camping was a bright note for the tourism industry in 2009, with the occupancy rate up 3.6 per cent, and sight-nights sold up 21.8 per cent. Of the visitors to the Island, 87.5 came from Canada, while 8.8 were from the United States, and 3.7 were international visitors. For more information on tourism, see tables 76 to 78 (pages 85 and 86).


Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$887.3 million in 2009, a decrease of 6.1 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment increased from \$171.1 million in 2008 to \$262.8 million in 2009, an increase of 53.6 per cent, while private sector investment fell by 19.3 per cent, from \$773.4 million in 2008 to \$624.5 million in 2009.

Non-residential investment grew 38.0 per cent in 2009. All sectors of non-residential investment contributed to this increase, with industrial investment up 17.8 per cent, commercial investment up 38.4 per cent, and government and institutional investment up 53.8 per cent.

Residential investment increased 5.9 per cent in 2009, largely due to increased investment in row houses, apartments and conversions. These segments increased 205.1 per cent, 194.8 per cent and 124.6 per cent respectively. Investment in singles and doubles declined in 2009, falling 12.0 per cent and 23.0 per cent respectively. Renovations also increased 3.8 per cent in 2009, likely as a result of the uptake of the home renovation tax credit, and investments in social housing.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 877 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2009, an increase of 23.2 per cent over 2008. As seen in Diagram 11, the increase was due to a large increase in row housing, apartments and other multi-unit

buildings, which increased from 132 in 2008 to 391 in 2009. Single dwelling housing starts fell by 17.5 per cent.

Transportation

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport decreased in 2009, the first decrease in 6 years. In 2009, 141,234 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 1.3 per cent from 2008), while 137,339 people left the province by air (down by -3.9 per cent). Total air passenger traffic was up down 1.3 per cent compared to 2008.

In 2009 the volume of product received at Island seaports, including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 1,050,411 metric tonnes, up by 8.6 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 6,577 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly potatoes, was shipped from the Summerside port. More transportation data can be found in Tables 89 to 90 (pages 92 and 93).

The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 1.1 per cent in 2009. Employment in the *health and social services* sector increased by 5.5 per cent.

Provincial Finance

The Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,376.9 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2008/09, 5.7 per cent higher than in FY 2007/08. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$805.1 million that year, an increase of 4.8 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 40.5 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2008/09 compared to 39.7 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 9.4 per cent to value \$321.7 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 4.5 per cent to total \$143.8 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 7.9 per cent to reach \$1,410 million.

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations shows a deficit for FY 2008/09 in the amount of \$33.1 million. As of March 31, 2009 the provincial net debt was \$1,408.6 million, up 4.6 per cent from 2008. More data on the government sector can be found at Tables 107 to 112 (pages 105 to 110).

















PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND FISHING DISTRICTS


