




### Welcome to the 2019 Annual Statistical Review

This has been made abundantly clear in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. There was a demonstrative need for the most up-to-date information on our





### A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings<sup>1</sup> of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.



Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.



### Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. His work was so accurate that many of the boundaries for lots and parishes he mapped are still used today. (Image: National Library and Archives Canada).

### **Economic Review 2019**

### Overview

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 4.5 per cent in 2019. Leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2012 chained prices): construction (up by \$48.4 million or 13.1 per cent), agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (up by \$32.0 million or 8.8 per cent), real estate and rental and leasing (up by \$27.1 million or 3.5 per cent), manufacturing (up by \$23.5 million or 3.9 per cent), and health care and social assistance (up by \$21.2 million or 3.7 per cent). Growth was broad based with 19 of 20 industries contributing to growth. The only sector showing a decline was management of companies and enterprises (down by \$1.8 million or 7.6 per cent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2019 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2020.

According to the Labour Force Survey, employment on Prince Edward Island increased for the third consecutive year in 2019, growing by 2.6 per cent to average 78,000 for the year. This was the second highest annual percentage growth among provinces. The unemployment rate averaged 8.8 per cent in 2019, down 0.6 percentage points from 2018. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island was up by 3.6 per cent in 2019 and total labour income increased by 4.5 per cent.


The change in the All-Items Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 1.2 per cent in 2019. Energy prices declined 3.8 per cent, while food prices increased 3.6 per cent and shelter was up by 0.6 per cent. The All-Items CPI for Canada increased by 1.9 per cent in 2019.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 17.8 per cent to \$2,302 million in 2019. This was the ninth consecutive year of growth for manufacturing shipments and the largest annual increase since 1998. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 7.9 per cent in 2019 to reach \$1.49 billion, a new all time high. This follows increases of 5.0 per cent in both 2017 and 2018.

### The Canadian Economy

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 1.6 per cent in 2019. This compares to a 2.0 per cent increase in 2018 and a 3.2 per cent increase in 2017. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2016 and 2019.

The slowdown in economic growth was largely attributed to weaker international trade and investment declines. Export volumes rose at a slower




pace, decelerating from 3.1 per cent growth in 2018 to 1.2 per cent in 2019. Household final consumption expenditure slowed to 1.6 per cent growth following a 2.2 per cent increase in 2018.

Goods producing industries decreased by 0.6 per cent while service producing industries expanded 2.5 per cent. Notable increases included real estate and rental and leasing, up 2.6 per cent, professional, scientific and technical services, up 4.5 per cent, health care and social assistance, up 3.2 per cent, finance and insurance, up 2.9 per cent, and public administration, up 2.1 per cent. Industrial sectors showing declines were mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction, down 4.6 per cent, construction, down 0.4 per cent, manufacturing, down 0.1 per cent, and management of companies and enterprises, down 1.0 per cent.

The all-items consumer price index for Canada increased 1.9 per cent in 2019. Notable increases were in food, up 3.4 per cent, housing, up 2.6 per cent, tobacco, alcohol and cannabis, up 1.9 per cent, clothing, up 1.7 per cent, and transportation, up 1.7 per cent. Energy prices saw a decline of 2.2 per cent compared to 2018. Core inflation (all items excluding food and energy) was 2.0 per cent in 2019.


Employment increased by 2.1 per cent to total 19.1 million. Gains were recorded in both the services sector (up 2.5 per cent) and the goods sector (up 0.7 per cent). Notable employment gains were seen in scientific and technical services, up 6.1 per cent, health care and social assistance, up 3.4 per cent, wholesale and retail trade, up 1.7 per cent, and transportation and warehousing, up 4.7 per cent. Notable declines occurred in

accommodation and food services, down 1.6 per cent, information, culture, and recreation, down 1.6 per cent, and other primary industries, down 2.4 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 5.7 per cent in 2019, a decrease of 0.1 percentage points from 2018. Diagram 2 shows percent employment change in Canada by sector.




### The American Economy

Real GDP growth in the United States increased 2.3 per cent in 2019, after advancing by 2.9 per cent in 2018. Increased positive contributions from personal consumption expenditures, non-residential fixed investment, federal, state and local government spending, and private inventory investments were partially offset by a negative contribution from residential fixed investment. Employment in the United States continued to advance, increasing by 1.4 per cent in 2019. The unemployment rate continued to decline further in the United States in 2019 falling by 0.2 percentage points from 3.9 per cent to 3.7 per cent.



### The Prince Edward Island Economy




### Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 4.5 per cent in chained 2012 dollars in 2019, following 2.8 per cent growth in 2018 and 4.4 per cent growth in 2017. Diagram 4 shows growth in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by Industry since 2010. For more information about GDP see Tables 38 to 44.3

### **Consumer Prices**

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island increased by 1.2 per cent in 2019, compared to a rise of 1.9 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 1.4 per cent in 2019. Food prices increased by 3.6 per cent over 2018, while shelter prices increased by 0.6 per cent.

The CPI Energy index decreased 3.8 per cent in 2019 following two consecutive years of increases. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2012 and 2019. Gasoline prices (regular self-serve) averaged \$1.148 per litre for 2019. Prices began the year just below the \$1.00 mark before rising to a peak of \$1.287 per litre in May. The price of home heating oil averaged \$0.975 per litre in 2019, ranging from a high of \$1.037 per litre in May to a



low of \$0.886 per litre in January. For more information on Consumer Prices, see Tables 45 - 48, and for more on fuel and oil prices and national comparisons, see Tables 92 to 96.

### Labour Force

The annual average of total employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 2.6 per cent from 76,000 in 2018 to an all-time high of 78,000 in 2019. Employment in the goods-producing sector increased by 1.5 per cent in 2019, while employment in the service providing sector increased by 2.8 per cent. The annual average unemployment rate decreased to 8.8 per cent in 2019, the lowest annual rate on current record (since 1976).





Diagram 6 indicates that notable employment increases occurred in public administration, construction, and health care and social assistance. Notable declines occurred in culture and recreation, accommodation and food services, and other primary industries. The labour force participation rate decreased from 66.8 per cent in 2018 to 66.5 per cent in 2019. Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours shows that employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 3.6 per cent in 2019, following an increase of 1.5 per cent in 2018. Notable declines were seen in accommodation and food services and arts, entertainment and recreation. Sectors showing the most growth were health care and social assistance and public administration. ### Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 4.5 per cent to reach \$3,641 million in 2019. Diagram 7 shows labour income growth from 2010 to 2019. The major contributors to growth in 2019 were in professional and personal services (up by 10.8 per cent), health care and social assistance (up by 8.4 per cent), and federal government administration (up by 3.7 per cent). ### **Population**

Revised population estimates based on the 2016 Census were published by Statistics Canada in September 2019. On July 1, 2019, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 156,947, an increase of 3,363 persons, or 2.2 per cent, over 2018. The population of Canada increased by 1.4 per cent over the same period. Preliminary data show that 2,267 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2018/19, while other international migration<sup>4</sup> totaled 968, resulting in a total of 3,235 for net international migration. Net interprovincial migration was 129, with Ontario, Nova Scotia, and Alberta being the top destinations of Islanders leaving for other provinces. Between July 1, 2018 and June 30, 2019 the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,397. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,398, resulting in natural growth (births minus deaths) of -1.

The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age<sup>5</sup> has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 43.2 years in 2019. Although the median age has declined slightly from 43.9 in 2016, this downward trend is not projected to continue. Furthermore, while only 11.0 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 19.7 per cent in 2019. The total dependency ratio<sup>6</sup> reached a low of 46.7 in 2007 and changed very little from 2007 to 2011. This ratio has increased from 47.0 to 54.7 in the last eight years.

According to the 2016 Census of Population count on May 10, 2016 there were 142,907 persons living on Prince Edward Island at that time. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15.



### **Industrial Profiles**

### Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2014 to 2019. Total shipments increased by 17.8 per cent in 2019 to a value of \$2,302 million, a new all time high. Manufacturing shipments have increased every year since 2010. Employment in the manufacturing sector decreased by 4.4 per cent to 6,500 in 2019.

### **Exports**

According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods grew from \$1,384 million in 2018 to \$1,492 million in 2019, an increase of 7.9 per cent. Exports of frozen food products made up 22.5 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2019. Its value increased from \$326.2 million in 2018 to \$335.4 million in 2019, an increase of 2.8 per cent. Other exports included *seafood products* valued at \$255.9 million (up 28.5 per cent from 2018), \$131.1 million in *aerospace products and parts* (down by 21.0 per cent) and \$121.5 million in *engine and turbine equipment* (down by 32.9 per cent).


### Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2019 totaled \$561.0 million, an increase of 9.4 per cent over 2018. This compares to an increase of 5.7 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts totaled \$342.7 million. Following a poor growing season in 2018, potato receipts, which made up 70.2 per cent of crop receipts, rebounded by 4.7 per cent to total \$240.6 million. Total livestock receipts decreased by 2.6 per cent to \$153.0 million, due to a 14.2 per cent drop in cattle receipts. Hog receipts were up by 24.9 per cent over 2018. Dairy receipts increased for the fourth consecutive year, rising 1.7 per cent to total \$88.6 million, while egg receipts increased by 7.8 per cent. Direct payments to farmers saw an increase of 57.4 per cent.

### Retail Trade

Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2019 increased for the tenth consecutive year, with a 3.6 per cent increase. Diagram 9 shows retails sales growth since 2010. Sales were valued at \$2,504.9 million. Notable increases were seen in motor vehicle and parts dealers, up 4.9 per cent or \$30.6 million, building and garden centers, up 7.4 per cent or \$18.4 million, supermarkets, up 2.5 per cent or \$11.0 million, and health and personal care stores, up 3.9 per cent or \$7.0




million. The number of new vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island increased in 2019, following two years of decline, increasing by 376 vehicles for a total of 8,110 on the year. The value of new vehicles sold increased by 11.2 per cent, reaching \$298.7 million, a new all-time high. Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector was 11,200, an increase of 0.9 per cent over 2018. Employment in this sector remains the largest employer in the province.

### **Fisheries**

The Department of Fisheries and Communities estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2019 increased by 18.5 per cent to \$349.0 million, a new all-time high following a 9.1 per cent decline in 2018. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 95.6 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Total lobster landings increased by 9.3 per cent in 2019 with total value growing by 19.1 per cent to reach an all-time high of \$238.5 million. Following two straight years in 2017 and 2018, lobster prices rebounded



to \$5.64/lb in 2019. Diagram 10 shows the value of lobster landings on PEI from 2010 to 2019. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs increased by 18.0 per cent in 2019.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 5.6 per cent lower than last year, falling to 10.1 million pounds. Prices decreased in 2019 for cod (down by 26.7 per cent to 66.0 cents/lb.) and rock crab (down by 7.3 per cent to 51.0 cents/lb). In addition to the increase in lobster prices, higher prices were also seen for herring (up by 84.0 per cent to 46.0 cents/lb.), oysters (up by 10.3 per cent to \$1.60/lb.), and mackerel (up by 17.2 per cent to 92.0 cents/lb).

### **Tourism**

The number of room nights sold increased by 3.6 per cent in 2019, while occupancy rates at Island accommodations fell to 45.6 per cent. Site nights sold at campgrounds declined slightly in 2019, down 1.8 per cent, with the occupancy rate up slightly to 47.9 per cent.

The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport was up 3.4 per cent in 2019, rising from 370,730 in 2018 to 383,183 in 2019. 190,761 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 3.4 per cent), while 192,422 people left the province by air (up by 3.3 per cent).

Ferry traffic<sup>7</sup> (passengers) decreased by 3.0 per cent in 2019, following a decrease of 1.5 per cent in 2018. Annual bridge traffic increased by 3.0 per cent in 2019, following an increase of 0.3 per cent in 2018. Summer bridge traffic (July and August) increased 2.6 per cent over the same period in 2018.


### Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island valued \$755.6 million in 2019, an increase of 3.5 per cent over 2018. Public sector investment increased from \$220.7 million in 2018 to \$289.3 million in 2019, an increase of 31.1 per cent, while private sector investment decreased by 8.5 per cent, from \$509.5 million in 2018 to \$466.4 million in 2019.

Non-residential investment increased by 30.3 per cent in 2019, due to a 103.1 per cent increase in industrial investment. Government and institutional investment decreased by 4.6 per cent, while commercial investment increased by 2.8 per cent.

Total residential investment increased 57.4 per cent in 2019, largely due to increased investment in multi-unit dwellings, which grew by 162.7 per cent. Investment in single family dwellings increased by 34.8 per cent, while investment in other types of units increased by 38.4 per cent in 2019.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 1,504 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2019. This is up by 415, or 38.1 per cent, from 2018 and the largest number of housing starts since 1973. As seen in Diagram 11, the



increase was mostly due to starts in apartments and row housing, which increased from 435 in 2018 to 899 in 2019. The annual vacancy rate in Charlottetown increased to 1.2 per cent in 2019 and remained 1.1 per cent in Summerside.

### The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in public administration (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 5.3 per cent in 2019. Employment in the health and social services sector increased by 4.3 per cent, while employment in the education sector increased by 5.0 per cent.

### Provincial Finance

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations for fiscal year 2018/19 shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$2,078.7 million in total revenue, 4.6 per cent higher than in FY 2017/18. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$1,295.0 million, an increase of 2.9 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 37.2 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2018/19 compared to 36.2 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 7.3 per cent to value \$418.8 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 4.1 per cent to total \$218.1 million. Total expenditures rose by 5.7 per cent to reach \$2,022 million.

The Consolidated Statement of Operations shows a surplus for FY 2018/19 in the amount of \$57.0 million. As of March 31, 2019 the provincial net debt was \$2,124 million, down 0.2 per cent from 2018.











Results of the Canadian Income Survey should not be compared to those produced by the Survey of Labour and Income Dynamics or other previous income surveys.

The low income cut-offs before tax (LICO-BT) are income thresholds below which a family will likely devote a larger share of its before-tax income on the necessities of food, shelter and clothing than the average family. The approach is essentially to estimate an income threshold at which families are expected to spend 20 percentage points more than the average family on food, shelter and clothing, based on the 1992 Family Expenditures Survey. LICOs are calculated in this manner for seven family sizes and five community sizes.

The Market Basket Measure (MBM) attempts to measure a standard of living that is a compromise between subsistence and social inclusion. It also reflects differences in living costs across regions. The MBM represents the cost of a basket that includes: a nutritious diet, clothing and footwear, shelter, transportation, and other necessary goods and services (such as personal care items or household supplies). The cost of the basket is compared to disposable income for each family to determine low income rates.

Low income measures (LIMs), are relative measures of low income, set at 50% of adjusted median household income. These measures are categorized according to the number of persons present in the household, reflecting the economies of scale inherent in household size.




