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CAPITAL BUDGET SCHEDULES

THE CAPITAL BUDGET ADDRESS

One Island - Working Together

Madame Speaker ... I rise in the House today to deliver our Government's third Capital Budget - One Island - Working Together 2010-2011 Capital Estimates. This Capital Budget is our second specifically designed to stimulate our economy during these difficult economic times.

This plan will continue with the direction outlined in last Fall's Capital Budget aimed at providing the necessary infrastructure Islanders need now and into the future. At the same time, we are stimulating the economy by providing much-needed jobs so Islanders and our local businesses can prosper.

We will successfully emerge from this temporary slowdown by working together, moving forward to ensure Islanders continue to flourish, and at the same time replace a lot of aging infrastructure which has deteriorated significantly in recent years.

Madame Speaker, the Conference Board of Canada recognized our efforts in its Provincial Outlook, where they stated that for Prince Edward Island the *government stimulus is one of the principal reasons the economy has not fallen into recession*.

Our Capital Plan is truly Island-wide, reaching communities throughout the Island. We are focusing on our priority areas of health and education, while continuing with improvements to the transportation infrastructure which is essential for transporting our people and moving our goods.

These initiatives, along with the infrastructure projects announced for municipalities and post-secondary institutions, have had the desired effect of stimulating our economy during this economic slowdown.

It should be noted, Madame Speaker, that the stimulus capital budget is a temporary measure and as the five year capital plan indicates, we will return to our normal spending levels, in the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

I am confident Islanders will emerge from these tough economic times more hopeful, more successful and more resilient than ever.

Economy

During the past year the economy performed relatively well with moderate growth of 0.5 percent. As indicators of this growth, Statistics Canada reports that the number of jobs increased by 2.3 percent in the past year and non-residential construction increased by 46.1 percent through the first three quarters.

These encouraging economic signs were a direct result of our stimulus package. Other direct impacts of the stimulus package were new tax revenues of \$9.7 million and an increase of \$53 million to our Provincial GDP.

Madame Speaker, to ensure that the recovery of our economy does not stall, the stimulus Capital Budget will continue into the next year. This will allow us to move ahead with the replacement of our aging infrastructure and at the same time enable us to

continue to provide much needed stimulus to the economy during challenging times.

The Capital Budget will allow for the creation of 1,625 jobs, new tax revenues of \$11.4 million and an improvement to the Provincial GDP of a further \$62 million in 2010-2011.

Health Care

Madame Speaker, Government continues to focus our efforts on rebuilding the system for providing health care to Islanders. Our hospitals and manors need to be modernized to ensure they continue to provide services that Islanders can be proud of. Over the next five years we will invest \$136.7 million in health facilities and equipment.

The capital expenditures for the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in the 2010-2015 period will total \$50.1 million. These costs will be partially offset by \$18.5 million in contributions to medical equipment from the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Foundation.

Madame Speaker, this will bring the total investment in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital over the redevelopment period to \$93 million. The expansion to the Cancer Treatment Centre, which opened this year, and the addition of dialysis services meant an increase of \$6.2 million to the original plan.

Our Government has committed \$400,000 for much-needed renovations to the Kings County Memorial Hospital. As well, the total cost of improvements to the Community Hospital in O'Leary are expected to be \$3.2 million.

Madame Speaker, this Budget commits \$65.3 million to upgrade our long-term care facilities. This represents an increase from last year because we recognize that providing an acceptable living environment for our seniors requires us to provide a comfortable

home setting. We have also accelerated the construction schedule for Colville and Maplewood Manors to ensure these facilities are replaced within a reasonable timeframe. This Budget also commits \$7.5 million to new seniors units.

The youth-at-risk facility will be constructed during the 2010-2011 year. Planning for this project is moving ahead and we expect to make an announcement in the near future, \$2.4 Million has been set aside for this project.

We have also allocated \$390,000 for health vehicles which will primarily be used for the replacement of high-mileage ambulances.

Education

Madame Speaker, this Budget plan will allocate funding for construction and capital improvements to Three Oaks, François-Buote and Souris schools. We have also increased our investment in the 2009-2010 year to over \$26 million in order to provide the required improvements to Glen Stewart and Westwood which are additions to our 2009-2010 Capital Plan. During the 2010-2011 year, we will complete construction on Elm Street, Montague High, Montague Intermediate and École Saint-Augustin.

In keeping with the Island Prosperity Strategy, we will ensure our children have access to modern computer and laboratory equipment. Beginning in 2011-2012, a technology refresh program for the Education Sector has been implemented to support curriculum and ensure a stable and reliable learning environment for students.

Madame Speaker, in recognizing the paramount importance of keeping our children safe, we continue to invest in our school bus fleet. This Budget commits a further \$12.3 million over the next five years for new school buses. It should be noted that by the

end of the current school year, we will have replaced 48% of the school bus fleet over three years, correcting a pattern of years of neglect.

Transportation

Madame Speaker, our transportation system is the backbone of our economy. It provides the link between our goods and their markets, between one community and another, but more importantly, it allows Islanders to connect with each other. The highway system requires continuous investment to ensure we get around efficiently and safely.

During the current year, the Department completed major repairs to 10 bridge structures, along with 40 kilometers of arterial and collector highways, sixteen kilometers of which was with the assistance of Federal stimulus funding. In addition, 105 kilometers of local highways were renewed.

This Budget commits \$229 million over the next five years to ensure our roads and bridges are modern and safe. Seven hundred kilometers of highway will be rebuilt along with 35 bridges to ensure a modern, well-maintained, safe highway system continues to be available to Islanders.

We have set aside funding for prospective projects as part of the Atlantic Gateway Strategy and continue our efforts to partner with the Federal Government to ensure these projects are accomplished.

Priorities

The BioCommons Research Park is now underway at the old Upton Farm site. The land has been acquired and a further \$12 million has been set aside to construct the necessary infrastructure to support the Park. This funding will be used to leverage our contribution with the private sector in order to maximize our investment.

Madame Speaker, we are continuing negotiations with the other Maritime Provinces and the Federal Government to establish a Maritime Emergency Radio System. This system will assist first responders to communicate with each other when emergencies occur. Over \$6 million has been allocated for this initiative.

A Provincial Museum remains a goal of this Government. Given the size, scope and historical significance of this project and the linkage to the 150th anniversary of the Charlottetown Conference which will be held in 2014, we will pursue negotiations with our partners in Confederation to determine the best way to bring this project to fruition.

Madame Speaker, our provincial libraries require investments to modernize facilities and equipment. A refresh of computer equipment and software, as well as an update to library headquarters will cost \$400,000.

During the current year, improvements are being made to the Provincial Correctional Facility. Our Government will be assessing the impact of these improvements to determine the long-term correctional needs of the Province.

Conclusion

Madame Speaker, by continuing with our bold capital stimulus budget, we are ensuring Islanders can weather the current economic slowdown. We continue to finance our stimulus package by exchanging high-cost long-term debt as it comes due, with lower-cost debentures. This along with increased revenues will enable our Government to absorb the increased amortization and interest as a result of this Capital Budget, within the Operating Budget, to achieve a balanced budget by the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

These infrastructure initiatives are necessary to ensure Government can continue to provide the services Islanders deserve. The improvements to our hospitals, manors, education facilities and transportation system will serve Islanders far into the future.

Madame Speaker, I am proud of our accomplishments, so far. This Capital Budget will ensure we make further progress towards rebuilding our infrastructure and protecting the lifestyle Islanders have come to enjoy.
