(c) the affected area is made non-harvestable by discing or similar action.

(a) by the revocation of Part I - COLE CROPS (Broccoli & Cauliflower) and the substitution of the following:

Part XII - ELITE SEED POTATO PLAN

1. This Schedule A Elite Seed Potato Plan forms an integral part of the CROP INSURANCE AGREEMENT and as such contains supplementary information specific for qualifying elite seed potato producers.
2. The purpose of this plan is to provide elite seed potato producers with the option to insure elite seed potatoes as a separate crop at higher unit prices.
3. To qualify under this plan, proof of seed class and post harvest virus test results must be submitted with the application, and all acres that are or will be registered for seed certification with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) during the crop year and meet the requirements and obligations under that program must be insured under this plan.
4. (1) The final planting date for crops insured under this plan are:
 - (a) May 31 for early varieties (70 - 110 days to maturity);
 - (b) May 26 for medium varieties (110 - 120 days to maturity); and
 - (c) May 19 for late and very late varieties (120 - 140 days to maturity).
 (2) The guaranteed yield shall be adjusted as prescribed in subsection 17(3) of this Agreement.
5. Coverage is restricted to 70% or 80% of the probable yield of elite seed for the crop insured under this section.
6. The probable yield for elite seed is determined by multiplying the probable yield figures for table and processing potatoes by the following factors:
 - (a) 0.8 for early varieties (70 - 110 days to maturity);
 - (b) 0.7 for medium varieties (110 - 120 days to maturity); and
 - (c) 0.6 for late and very late varieties (120 - 140 days to maturity).
7. To reflect the added risks, the premium rate for a crop insured under this plan is 130% of the premium rate for the same crop insured at the same level of coverage for table and processing potatoes.
8. Seed identified as nuclear (mini tubers), pre-elite, elite-I, elite-II, elite-III or elite-IV qualifies for insurance under this plan provided the post harvest virus test results show 5% or less total virus (PVY and PLRV).
9. The unit price selected depends on the class of seed planted and cannot exceed
 - (a) \$125.00 per cwt for nuclear (mini tubers) seed planted and expected to be harvested as pre-elite;
 - (b) \$40.00 per cwt for pre-elite or better seed planted and expected to be harvested as elite-I;
 - (c) \$20.00 per cwt for elite-I or better seed planted and expected to be harvested as elite-II;
 - (d) \$16.50 per cwt for elite-II or better seed planted and expected to be harvested as elite III; and
 - (e) \$13.00 per cwt for elite-IV or better seed planted and expected to be harvested as foundation; and

(f) \$6.50 per cwt for foundation or better and expected to be harvested as table or processing potatoes.

10. To avoid quality adjustment based on pre-existing conditions, all acres insured must pass as seed during the first CFIA field inspection after June 30 of the crop year; the insurance coverage on any acres that were rejected during or before that inspection will be changed to Part V - Potatoes crop insurance coverage.

11. The potato tops on all acres of the insured crop which retain a seed classification of foundation or better by August 12 of the crop year must be completely dead on or before that date to qualify for quality adjustments after that date.

12. Production to count will be adjusted for quality by multiplying measured production at the final classification with the following factor: (unit price listed in section 8 for final class harvested) / (unit price at which the crop was insured).

13. (1) Excess production in one seed classification within an insured crop will reduce the indemnity payable on the shortfall in production to count in another seed classification by an amount equal to the excess production in cwt multiplied by the unit price for that seed classification.

(2) Excess production in Part XII - Elite Seed Potato Plan will not offset a shortfall in production in Part V - Potatoes, or vice versa.

14. Any Stage II losses will be calculated using the sliding scale from 50% to 75% of insured value as described in section 24 and Schedule A Part V - Potatoes, and full offset between Stage II and Stage III will apply except for late blight cases meeting conditions in clause 24(5.1)(b).

(e) by the addition of the following:

Part XV - APPLE PLAN

This Schedule A Apple Plan forms an integral part of the CROP INSURANCE AGREEMENT and as such contains supplementary information specific to apple trees and apple production.

SECTION A - Apple Tree Insurance

1. The purpose of this plan is to provide insurance for apple trees damaged as a result of the following perils:

- (a) wind
- (b) winter injury, excluding mouse damage;
- (c) snow;
- (d) ice;
- (e) virus diseases;
- (f) canker;
- (g) fireblight (*erwinia amylovora*).

2. The crop year for tree insurance is the period from December 1 in any year to November 30 of the following year.

3. The application deadline for apple tree insurance is November 30 prior to the start of the crop year.

4. Coverage under this plan shall be based upon the following table of insurable values per tree, considering tree age and type or planting density:

<125 / acre Standard	\$6.00	\$9.00	\$12.00	\$15.00	\$18.00	\$25.00	50 years

Tree age 1 means the year following the year the trees were planted.

5. (1) The insured shall notify the Corporation within five days of discovering tree damage from one or more of the insured perils.

(2) The insured shall notify the Corporation ten days prior to the destruction or removal of trees.

6. (1) Indemnity shall be paid for damaged trees due to insurable perils, less the deductible equal to 3% of the number of insured trees.

(2) Indemnity will be paid at the insured value for the damaged trees beyond the 3% deductible, after the trees have been removed.

SECTION B - Apple Production Insurance

1. The probable yield is based on the insured's weighted average production for the latest ten-year period.

2. The insured will not receive a provincial benchmark but must supply production data for a minimum of two consecutive years immediately prior to the year production insurance is requested which will be used to determine the insured's probable yield.

3. Production to count will be based on:

(a) pounds of U-pick apples sold;

(b) pounds of fresh packed Canada Fancy apples sold or in storage;

(c) pounds of processed or juice apples sold or in storage with a quality adjustment based on price ratio compared to fresh packed; or

(d) yield measurements prior to harvest based on estimated pounds per tree and allowing for normal drop rates of 10%; subsequent losses due to wind prior to October 25 will require new estimates to determine the actual loss.

4. Production from trees of different ages must be monitored separately to apply the calculations in section 6 of this supplement.

5. Conversion of marketing from fresh packed apples to U-pick apples or reverse will result in adjustments to probable yield as follows:

(a) From fresh packed apples to U-pick apples will have the probable yield based on previously harvested production multiplied by 3/4 (or 75%);

(b) From U-pick apples to fresh packed apples will have the probable yield based on previously harvested production multiplied by 4/3 (or 133.3%).

6. Newly planted orchards using dwarf or semi-dwarf trees will only be insured when trees are 8 years old and based on production during the previous two years. The probable yield calculation assumes that production starts in year 6 and continues to increase in linear fashion until year 12 at which time it should stabilize. The probable yield for newly planted dwarf or semi-dwarf trees is calculated using the following formulas, where yr_yld is the average yield for the age of the trees:

7. The final date for production insurance is October 25 of the crop year.

4. Schedule B is amended in paragraph 9. by the addition of

- (a) the word “1/3” immediately after the word “shared”;
- (b) the word “2/3” immediately after the words “province and”.

5. These regulations are deemed to have come into force on April 1, 2001.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

These amendments add specific categories of cole crops to the insurance scheme. Other changes update transplanting dates, unit prices and probable yield calculations applicable to cauliflower and broccoli. Schedule A is amended by the revocation and substitution of Part 1 - Cole Crops, Part VIII - Tobacco, Part XII - Elite Seed Potato Plan, and the addition of Part XV - Apple Plan. Schedule B is revised to specify cost-shared amounts.

REGULATIONS**

(Approved by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council dated 17 July 2001.)

Pursuant to section 28 of the *Civil Service Superannuation Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. C-9, Council made the following regulations:

1. In these regulations

- (a) “early election” means

deferred election	(b) “deferred election” means election made more than 180 days from the date of return to work;

employed full-time	(d) “employed full-time” means guaranteed employment of 1950 hours per year or guaranteed employment of 2080 hours per year;
leave	(e) “leave”, for the purposes of these regulations, means maternity, parental or adoption leave.
Purchase leave for pension purposes	2. (1) Subject to these regulations, a member may elect in writing to purchase the period of leave for the purposes of the calculation of pensionable service, after returning to work.
Exception	(2) Subsection (1) does not apply if the period of leave is already included as pensionable service used to calculate the pension under the Act or under any other pension plan.
Based on guaranteed hours	(3) Where the member was not employed full-time on the date on which the leave commenced, the member may purchase only that portion of the leave based on the member’s guaranteed hours immediately prior to the leave.
Election available to contributor	(4) An election shall be made by a member while the member is still a contributor to the Fund.
Cost	3. The cost to the member of purchasing all or a portion of the service attributable to the leave taken by the member shall be <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) if an early election is made, an amount equal to one year or a fraction of a year of the service being purchased, multiplied by the amount of contributions the member would be required to make in a year under section 7 of the Act, based on the member’s annualized full-time equivalent earnings rate at the time the member made the election; or (b) if a deferred election is made, an amount equal to the full actuarial cost to the Fund of the purchased service.
Lump sum or instalments	4. (1) Subject to subsection 5(1), the amount payable by a member pursuant to section 3 may be paid in a lump sum or in instalments over a period not exceeding twice the total period of service being purchased.
Early election	(2) Where a member has chosen the early election option, the member shall commence payments or pay the lump sum payment not later than 90 days from the date of early election.

(3) Where a member has chosen the deferred election, the member shall commence payments or pay the lump sum payment not later than 90 days from the date of deferred election. Deferred election

(4) Interest shall be charged on instalment payments at the discount rate set out in the most current actuarial valuation of the Fund. Interest

5. (1) Where a member terminates employment prior to completing full payment for the purchase of the service, the full remaining balance of the cost of the service becomes payable within 14 days of the termination of employment. Terminates employment

(2) Where the balance is not paid pursuant to subsection (1), the amount of service respecting the leave, to be included in calculating pension entitlement, shall be adjusted *pro rata* to reflect the portion of the full cost of the service actually paid by the member. Pro rata adjustment

6. (1) Where required under the *Income Tax Act* (Canada), a past service pension adjustment shall be filed by the Minister with the appropriate government authorities for their approval or certification. Income Tax Act requirements

(2) Notwithstanding any other provision of these regulations, no benefits shall be paid with respect to service purchased under these regulations prior to compliance with subsection (1). Compliance with subsection (1)

7. The length of the period of leave that may be purchased under these regulations is subject to the overall limits imposed by the *Income Tax Act* (Canada) and regulations on the crediting of service in a registered pension plan. Limits

8. These regulations come into force on July 17, 2001. Effective date

EXPLANATORY NOTES

SECTION 1 defines the terms used in the regulations.

SECTION 2 allows an employee to purchase pensionable service for a period of maternity, parental or adoption leave.

SECTION 3 determines the cost of purchasing the service for the period of leave.

SECTION 4 determines how payment for the leave will be made.

SECTION 5 requires full payment for the purchased service to be made within 14 days of the termination of employment.

SECTION 6 requires filing of the appropriate information with government authorities before benefits are payable in respect of the service.

SECTION 7 ensures that the service purchased complies with the federal *Income Tax Act* and the regulations.

TEMPORARY EXEMPTION FROM PENSION SUSPENSION
REGULATIONS**

(Approved by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council dated 17 July 2001.)

Pursuant to section 28 of the *Civil Service Superannuation Act R.S.P.E.I.* 1988, Cap. C-9, Council made the following regulations:

Definitions	1. (1) In these regulations
Committee	(a) “Committee” means the Civil Service Superannuation Fund Pension Administration Advisory Committee;
employer	(b) “employer” means an employer listed in the Participating Employer regulations.
Application	(2) These regulations apply to employers and pensioners who are re-employed by an employer.
<i>Idem</i>	(3) These regulations do not apply to a person receiving a pension as a beneficiary under the Act.
Re-employment of pensioner	2. (1) A pensioner under the Act may be re-employed by an employer, without a suspension of pension benefits, in accordance with these regulations.
Re-employment, meaning	(2) Re-employment, for the purposes of these regulations, means employment of a pensioner by any employer that participates in the Fund.
Not pensionable service	(3) Periods during which a pensioner works pursuant to these regulations shall not be counted as pensionable service for the purpose of calculating or re-calculating pension payments under the Act.
No contributions	(4) A pensioner re-employed under these regulations shall not be eligible to make contributions to the Fund.
Exempt class of pensioners	3. (1) An employer that wishes to have a specified class of pensioner be declared exempt from suspension of pension upon re-employment

pursuant to section 16 of the Act shall send an application for exemption of a class to the Committee for review.

(2) The Committee shall review the application and forward its recommendations to the Lieutenant Governor in Council. Committee reviews

(3) Subject to subsection 16(3) of the Act and to these regulations, the Lieutenant Governor in Council, after considering the recommendations of the Committee, may order the exemption of a class of pensioners from suspension of pension payments, on such terms and conditions as it may consider appropriate. Exemption order

(4) Schedule A shall contain a list of exemptions for classes of pensioners and exemption extensions, as ordered by Executive Council from time to time. Schedule A

4. (1) Subject to subsection (2), an exemption ordered respecting a class of pensioners shall not exceed two years. Two-year exemption

(2) The Lieutenant Governor in Council may extend the exemption of a class of pensioners for additional periods of up to two years, in the manner provided by section 3. Extensions

5. (1) No pensioner shall be exempt from the suspension of pension provisions under section 16 of the Act unless, prior to re-employment, Prior approval to be included in class

- (a) the pensioner applies to the employer to be included in an exempt class; and
- (b) the pensioner is approved for inclusion in an exempt class in accordance with these regulations.

(2) Prior to re-employment of a pensioner, an employer shall notify the Minister in writing of the intention to include the pensioner in an exempt class. Notify Minister

(3) Notwithstanding subsections (1) and (2), where, in the opinion of the Minister, a pensioner does not qualify for inclusion in an exempt class in accordance with section 6, the pensioner shall not be eligible for exemption from suspension of pension under these regulations and the pensioner's pension shall be suspended in accordance with the Act. Pensioner not qualified

6. Subject to section 5, upon re-employment, a pensioner may continue to receive a pension as a member of an exempt class, provided that Continued pension

- (a) re-employment is a casual appointment only;
- (b) the pensioner is not eligible to make contributions nor accrue service under the Act in respect of the re-employment;
- (c) the re-employment with one or more participating employers shall not exceed 75 hours per month, nor 600 hours per year; and
- (d) the qualifications of the pensioner for the job shall be relevant and closely related to the exempt class.

Annual report	7. (1) An employer who has re-employed a pensioner under these regulations shall submit an annual written report to the Minister during the period of re-employment not later than June 1 of each year following the calendar year of re-employment.
Contents of report	(2) The report to the Minister shall include (a) the total number of hours worked by the pensioner for each month of the previous calendar year; (b) the total number of hours worked by the pensioner during the previous calendar year; and (c) such other information as the Minister may require.
Excess hours	8. Where the total number of hours worked in a month or year exceeds the maximum number of hours allowed under section 6, (a) the excess hours shall be subject to pension suspension under the Act; and (b) the Administrator shall deduct from the pensioner's pension, an amount equal to the income derived from the excess hours.
Effective date	9. These regulations come into force on July 17, 2001.

SCHEDULE A

Exemptions Ordered

1. Registered nurses employed by a regional authority under the *Health and Community Services Act R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. H-1.*

EXPLANATORY NOTES

SECTION 1 defines terms used and specifies the application of the regulations.

SECTION 2 allows and clarifies re-employment, ensures that the period is not counted as service for pension purposes and ensures that contributions are not made to the Fund.

SECTION 3 provides the process for having a class of pensioners exempt from suspension of the pension provisions of the Act and requires the exemptions to be listed in the Schedule.

SECTION 4 provides that exemptions for a class of pensioners may be ordered for two years with extensions of up to two years.

SECTION 5 sets out the conditions for inclusion in an exempt class. The Minister may disallow the inclusion of a pensioner in an exempt class.

SECTION 6 allows continued receipt of the pension subject to the stated conditions.

SECTION 7 requires annual reports to the Minister.

SECTION 8 ensures that hours worked in excess of the maximum allowed are subject to suspension of pension.

Compliance with subsection (1)	(2) Notwithstanding any other provision of these regulations, no benefits shall be paid with respect to service purchased under these regulations prior to the receipt of any required approval or certification of the purchase by the appropriate government authorities pursuant to the <i>Income Tax Act</i> (Canada).
Limits	7. The length of the period of leave that may be purchased under these regulations is subject to the overall limits imposed by the <i>Income Tax Act</i> (Canada) and regulations on the crediting of service in a registered pension plan.
Effective date	8. These regulations come into force on September 1, 2001.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

SECTION 1 defines the terms used in the regulations.

SECTION 2 allows an employee to purchase pensionable service for a period of maternity, parental or adoption leave.

SECTION 3 determines the cost of purchasing the service for the period of leave.

SECTION 4 determines how payment for the leave will be made.

SECTION 5 requires full payment for the purchased service to be made within 14 days of termination of employment.

SECTION 6 requires filing of the appropriate information with government authorities before benefits are payable in respect of the service.

SECTION 7 ensures that the service purchased complies with the federal *Income Tax Act* and the regulations under that Act.
