WHEREAS in and by section 52 of Chapter 31 of the Acts passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island in the Third Session thereof held in the year 2018 and in the sixty-seventh year of Our Reign intituled “Registered Professional Planners Act” it is enacted as follows:

“This Act comes into force on a date that may be fixed by proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.”,

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient that the said Act, Stats. P.E.I. 2018, c. 31 should come into force on the 26th day of December, 2020,

NOW KNOW YE that We, by and with the advice and consent of our Executive Council for Prince Edward Island, do by this Our Proclamation ORDER AND DECLARE that the said Act being the “Registered Professional Planners Act” passed in the sixty-seventh year of Our Reign shall come into force on the twenty-sixth day of December, two thousand and twenty of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

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**IN THE MATTER OF the *Public Health Act*, RSPEI 1988, c P-30.1 (the “Act”)**

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**COVID-19 PREVENTION AND SELF-ISOLATION ORDER**

TO: All persons residing in or present in Prince Edward Island; and

All businesses, services and organizations operating or carrying on business in Prince Edward Island

**WHEREAS** a state of public health emergency was declared in Prince Edward Island on March 16, 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic pursuant to Order in Council EC2020-174, and continued on April 15, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-254, on May 15, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-305, on June 15, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-350, on July 14, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-435, on August 14, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-488, on September 13, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-542, on October 13, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-603, on November 12, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-649 and on December 12, 2020 by Order in Council EC2020-724;

**AND WHEREAS** in consultation with the Lieutenant Governor in Council, I believe it is reasonably necessary to impose special measures in the Province in order to protect the health of the population;

**AND WHEREAS** I, as the Chief Public Health Officer, pursuant to subsection 39(2) of the Act, believe on reasonable and probable grounds that:

- (a) a communicable disease, COVID-19, exists or may exist in the Province;
- (b) the communicable disease presents a risk to the health of persons in the Province; and
- (c) the requirements specified in this Order are necessary to prevent, decrease or eliminate the risk to health presented by the communicable disease;

**AND WHEREAS** pursuant to subsection 39(1) of the Act, I, as the Chief Public Health Officer, may require a person to take or refrain from taking any action that is specified in this Order in respect of a communicable disease;

**AND WHEREAS** pursuant to clauses 49(2)(c.1) and (d) of the Act, I, as the Chief Public Health Officer, may order persons to refrain from entering or attending a public place or premises; to refrain from assembling in a public gathering in a specified area; limit the number of persons who will be permitted to attend a public gathering; or limit the purpose for a public gathering;

**AND WHEREAS** pursuant to clause 49(2)(g) of the Act, I, as the Chief Public Health Officer, may order any other measure that is reasonably believed to be necessary for the protection of the health of the population during the public health emergency;

**AND WHEREAS** the reasons for this Order are the global COVID-19 pandemic, the health risks posed by the pandemic, and the necessity to prevent, decrease or eliminate those health risks;

**AND WHEREAS** pursuant to subsection 56(1) of the Act, I, as the Chief Public Health Officer, may require any person to provide information that the Chief Public Health Officer reasonably considers necessary to:

- (a) assess the threat that a disease presents to public health and plan for and address the threat; or
- (b) evaluate and monitor the health and safety of the general public.

**NOW THEREFORE**, pursuant to my authority under subsections 39(1), 49(2), 49(3), and 56(1) of the Act, I hereby order as follows:

**Definitions**

1. In this Order:

(a) “allowable services” means services that are not essential services and are appropriate to open to the public, as determined by the Chief Public Health Officer, with certain public health measures in place.

(b) “close contact” means:

(i) A person who provides care for or has close physical contact with a person who is confirmed or suspected to be infected with COVID-19; or

(ii) A person who comes into direct contact with the infectious body fluids of a person who is confirmed or suspected to be infected with COVID-19;

but does not include

A) a person who consistently and appropriately uses personal protective equipment while caring for a person who is confirmed or suspected to be infected with COVID-19; or

B) effective September 1, 2020, a person who is a member of the household of a person who is suspected to be infected with COVID-19 and is awaiting a COVID-19 test result.

(c) “essential services” means services that, if interrupted, would endanger the life, health, or personal safety of the whole or part of the population.

(d) “household” means persons who normally reside together at a residence.

(e) “mask” means a commercial medical or non-medical mask or home-made mask made in accordance with the Public Health Agency of Canada instructions located at: <https://www.canada.ca/en/public-health/services/diseases/2019-novel-coronavirus-infection/prevention-risks/sew-no-sew-instructions-non-medical-masks-face-coverings.html>, that covers the nose and mouth.

(f) “public place” means any part of the following places accessible to the public, insofar as it is enclosed:

(i) a retail business, a shopping centre, or a building or room of a business where services are provided;

(ii) a restaurant or a liquor licensed establishment;

(iii) a place of worship or faith gathering;

(iv) a place where activities or services of a cultural or entertainment nature are offered;

(v) a place where sports are played or recreational activities are carried on;

(vi) a rental hall or other place used to hold events, including conventions and conferences, or to hold receptions;

- (vii) a place where Government services are available to the public;
  - (viii) a common area, including an elevator, in a tourism establishment, as defined under the *Tourism Industry Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. T-3.3;
  - (ix) a lobby, reception area, stairwell or elevator in an office building other than an apartment building;
  - (x) a common area or public space on a university or college campus; and
  - (xi) a train or bus station, a ferry terminal, or an airport.
- (g) “self-isolate” means compliance with the following measures:
- (i) A person must remain in their residence or residence grounds, except to seek medical care or due to extraordinary circumstances including reasons of personal safety. A person who resides in an apartment building, condominium, rental accommodation, rooming house, or other attached housing must remain on the residence’s property and maintain a two-metre distance from other persons at all times while in common areas, corridors, stairwells, elevators, other shared spaces, and outdoors;
  - (ii) If a person must leave their residence or the residence’s property for a reason outlined in clause (i) above, the person must maintain a two-metre distance from other persons at all times, other than during treatment by a health care worker; and
  - (iii) all additional self-isolation requirements published at:  
  
<https://www.princeedwardisland.ca/en/information/health-and-wellness/covid-19-self-isolation>.

### Points of Entry

2. Every person arriving on Prince Edward Island at any and all points of entry shall:
- (a) stop when instructed to do so by a peace officer or public health official;
  - (b) answer any questions posed and provide all information requested by a peace officer, public health official, or health practitioner, including but not limited to: name, place of ordinary residence, license plate number, contact information, travel details, reason for travelling into the Province, occupation, employer, employer contact, work location and symptom information;
  - (c) if requested, submit to such tests and examinations as may be required;
  - (d) declare if they are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 including coughing, difficulty breathing, or fever; and
  - (e) provide complete details of their self-isolation plan.

### Mandatory Self-Isolation

3. Unless exempted by the Self-Isolation Exemption Order, persons travelling into, residing in or present in Prince Edward Island who fall under any of the categories below shall self-isolate for the period of time specified:

- (a) Persons diagnosed with COVID-19 shall self-isolate for a period of at least 14 days after the onset of symptoms and such additional time until the person is cleared by a public health official.
- (b) Persons who are symptomatic and awaiting the results of a test for COVID-19 shall self-isolate as follows:
  - (i) Persons who are symptomatic with exposure criteria (history of travel or a close contact with a positive case) shall self-isolate for 14 days from the last potential exposure (date of return from travel or last contact with a positive case), regardless of whether a negative test result is received during that period;
  - (ii) Persons who are symptomatic without exposure criteria (no history of travel, no known contact with a positive case) are not required to self-isolate after receipt of a negative COVID-19 test result, unless otherwise instructed by a public health official.
- (c) Persons identified as a close contact of a confirmed or suspected case of COVID-19, shall self-isolate for a period of 14 days from the last day of being a close contact, regardless of whether a negative test result for COVID-19 is received during that period. For greater certainty, a person is no longer considered a suspected case if they fall under clause 3(b)(ii) and have received a negative COVID-19 test result.
- (d) Persons travelling into the Province from outside Canada on and after March 8, 2020 shall self-isolate for 14 days from the date of their entry to Canada or for the duration of their stay in the Province (if shorter than 14 days), regardless of whether a negative test result for COVID-19 is received during that period.
- (e) Persons travelling into the Province from within Canada on and after March 21, 2020 shall self-isolate for 14 days or for the duration of their stay in the Province (if shorter than 14 days), regardless of whether a negative test result for COVID-19 is received during that period.

#### **Mandatory Self-Isolation – Temporary Foreign Workers**

- 4. Subject to section 5, effective April 17, 2020 at 8:00 a.m., all temporary foreign workers travelling into the Province shall self-isolate for 14 days at a quarantine facility designated by the Minister of Health and Wellness, regardless of whether a negative test result for COVID-19 is received during that period.
- 5. The following temporary foreign workers are exempt from the requirements in section 4:
  - (a) temporary foreign workers employed by an employer that has submitted a transition plan which addresses self-isolation requirements, and which plan has been approved by the Chief Public Health Officer; and
  - (b) such other temporary foreign workers as may be otherwise exempted by the Chief Public Health Officer under exceptional circumstances, provided satisfactory arrangements have been made for the temporary foreign worker to comply with self-isolation requirements.
- 6. Temporary foreign workers exempted from the requirements of section 4 who travel into the Province shall remain subject to the requirement to self-isolate in accordance with this Order, an applicable transition plan, and applicable directions of the Chief Public Health Officer.

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**Masking Requirements**

7. Effective 12:01 a.m. November 20, 2020, all persons must wear a mask while present in a public place.
8. Notwithstanding section 7, a person is exempt from the requirement to wear a mask while present in a public place if the person:
  - (a) is less than 2 years of age;
  - (b) is age 2 to 5 years and will not wear a mask;
  - (c) is a person for whom the wearing of the mask is not possible because of the person's medical condition;
  - (d) cannot remove their mask without assistance;
  - (e) is reasonably accommodated by not wearing a mask in accordance with the *Human Rights Act* R.S.P.E.I 1988, Cap. H-12;
  - (f) is in the public place receiving care or being provided a service or while participating in a physical or other activity requiring the mask be removed, in which case the person may remove the mask for the duration of the care, service or activity;
  - (g) removes the mask momentarily for identification or ceremonial purposes;
  - (h) is in a courtroom, jury room or secured area in a courthouse, or room where a proceeding or meeting of an administrative tribunal established by legislation is being held;
  - (i) is consuming food or a beverage in a public place;
  - (j) is a performer, performers in a small group or an officiant in the course of performing activities requiring the playing of a wind instrument, or vocalization such as talking or singing at the following events or activities:
    - (i) conventions, conferences or speaking engagements;
    - (ii) social events;
    - (iii) arts and culture events;
    - (iv) sports and physical activity; or
    - (v) weddings, funerals and other faith gatherings.
9. Effective 12:01 a.m. November 20, 2020, all persons must wear a mask while travelling on vehicles providing transportation to the public, including:
  - (a) any public transit, including municipally-operated buses;
  - (b) any public passenger vehicle, including community transit vehicles, commercial vehicles (shuttle vans), and vehicles providing charters or tours or both;

- 
- (c) any school buses operated by an education authority under the *Education Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. E-02, and any vehicles of any capacity operated by private schools registered under the *Private Schools Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. P-20.01;
  - (d) commuter vehicles, courtesy vehicles, vans, mini-buses, or buses of any passenger capacity providing services to the public;
  - (e) taxicabs, as defined in the *Highway Traffic Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. H-5, operating in Prince Edward Island.
10. Notwithstanding section 9, the following persons are exempt from the requirement to wear a mask while travelling on vehicles providing transportation to the public:
- (a) a person who is less than 2 years of age;
  - (b) a person who is age 2 to 5 years and will not wear a mask;
  - (c) a person for whom the wearing of a mask is not possible because of the person's medical condition;
  - (d) a person who cannot remove their mask without assistance; and
  - (e) a person who is reasonably accommodated by not wearing a mask in accordance with the *Human Rights Act*, supra.
11. A person may remove the mask momentarily for identification purposes when boarding any public transit set out in section 9.
12. The requirements to wear a mask as set out in this Order do not apply to persons in public places that are in compliance with the following, as applicable:
- (a) Directive on Visitation to Long-Term Care Facilities and Nursing Homes;
  - (b) Directive on Schools;
  - (c) Directive on Licensed Child Care Centres;
  - (d) Guidance for Unlicensed Child Care Centres; and
  - (e) Private Community Care Facilities Visitation Guidance.
13. For greater certainty, the requirements to wear a mask as set out in this Order are the minimum standards that persons, businesses, services and organizations must adhere to, and where the business, service or organization's operational plan required in accordance with this Order imposes a greater standard, then that standard applies.
14. For greater certainty, the requirements to wear a mask as set out in this Order do not replace the importance of compliance with all other public health preventative measures required such as physical distancing and hand hygiene.
15. For greater certainty, nothing in this Order affects in any way the masking requirements set out in the Self-Isolation Exemption Order.



**Businesses, Services and Organizations**

16. Effective March 17, 2020, businesses, services and organizations that are not an essential service or an allowable service shall not offer or provide services to the public at a location that is accessible to the public.
17. Effective December 18, 2020, businesses, services and organizations outlined here must comply at all times with the preventative measures described in this section, in addition to following all applicable public health measures:
  - (a) Operators of businesses, services and organizations that offer food and beverage services, including licensed facilities, may open the business, service or organization to the public, but must:
    - (i) limit the number of persons on the premises in accordance with the Organized Gatherings section of this Order;
    - (ii) close their in-person premises at 11 p.m. each day;
    - (iii) limit table capacity to a maximum of 10 persons at a table; and
    - (iv) take every reasonable step to ensure patrons remain seated at all times, except for when entering, exiting or using the washroom.
  - (b) Operators of businesses, services and organizations that operate recreation facilities, including fitness facilities, gyms, museums, libraries and casinos, may open the business, service or organization to the public, but must ensure that occupancy of the facility is restricted to 50% of the standard operating capacity;
  - (c) Operators of businesses, services or organizations that offer organized recreation or team sports may resume those activities, in accordance with the Organized Gatherings section of this Order, but tournaments for organized recreation or team sports are prohibited;
  - (d) Operators of businesses, services and organizations that offer personal services, such as hair and nail services, massage services, tattoo services and acupuncture services, must ensure these services are only offered by appointment and that a non-medical mask is worn at all times by employees and patrons;
  - (e) Operators of businesses, services and organizations that offer retail services, such as retail stores, markets and craft fairs, must ensure the occupancy of the operational retail space of the retail service is restricted to 50% of the standard operating capacity of that space and that entrances and exits are monitored to ensure that capacity is not exceeded;
  - (f) Operators of businesses, services or organizations that operate movie theatres, concert halls and bingo halls may open to the public, in accordance with the Organized Gatherings section of this Order.
18. Businesses, services and organizations that are closed to the public under section 17 may continue to operate serving the public by means of telephone, virtual services, delivery, and pick-up, provided that owners and operators of those services comply at all times with the preventative measures described under this Order.
19. Owners and operators of businesses, services and organizations that are permitted to operate under this Order shall take the following preventative measures:

- (a) take every reasonable step to ensure minimal interaction of people (including employees and patrons) within two metres of each other;
  - (b) take every reasonable step necessary to prevent employees who are required to self-isolate, as provided above, from entering workplaces;
  - (c) develop and follow an exclusion policy that ensures symptomatic employees are immediately excluded from work activities;
  - (d) develop and follow an operational plan detailing how risk of transmission of COVID-19 will be mitigated;
  - (e) ensure enhanced cleaning and disinfection of shared areas and surfaces;
  - (f) ensure hand washing stations are available;
  - (g) ensure compliance with masking requirements set out in this Order;
  - (h) follow any direction issued to a specific class of businesses, services or organizations, as referenced in Appendix A, as may be amended from time to time; and
  - (i) follow any other direction issued to the business, service or organization by the Chief Public Health Officer.
20. Effective May 22, 2020, all child care facilities, including licensed and unlicensed centres, are permitted to re-open to the public. Licensed centres must comply with the Chief Public Health Officer's Directive on Licensed Child Care Centres, as may be amended from time to time. Unlicensed centres must comply with the Chief Public Health Officer's Guidance for Unlicensed Child Care Centres, as may be amended from time to time.
21. Effective September 23, 2020, all public and private schools in the Province must comply with the Chief Public Health Officer's Directive on Schools, as may be amended from time to time.

### **Personal Gatherings**

22. Except as outlined in section 23, all persons are prohibited from attending a personal gathering with persons outside their household at an indoor location or at an outdoor location. A personal gathering includes a gathering at a private residence, public space or public place and which includes members from different households.
23. Section 22 does not apply to:
- (a) organized gatherings which are conducted in accordance with the Organized Gathering section of this Order;
  - (b) businesses, services or organizations (including child care facilities) which are permitted to operate under the Businesses, Services and Organizations section of this Order or any specific direction of the Chief Public Health Officer;
  - (c) facilities where health care or social services are provided;
  - (d) a service provider who enters a residence to perform work at the residence; and
  - (e) an individual or household who gathers at an indoor location or at an outdoor location where:

- (i) members of one household gather with no more than ten individuals, from one or more other households, at one time;
- (ii) each individual at the gathering takes every reasonable step to maintain a distance of two metres or more from persons who do not reside in their household; and
- (iii) all members of a household take every reasonable step to limit contact with other persons outside their household to the same ten individuals from other households.

### **Organized Gatherings**

24. Except as permitted under sections 25 and 26, no person shall hold an organized gathering at an indoor location or at an outdoor location.
25. Organized gatherings, including worship services, of up to 50 persons, in addition to staff and officials necessary for the gathering, are permitted to be held at an indoor location or at an outdoor location provided the organizer:
- (a) develops, follows and makes available for inspection, an operational plan detailing how risk of transmission of COVID-19 will be mitigated at the gathering;
  - (b) takes every reasonable step to ensure minimal interaction of people within two metres of each other
  - (c) maintains a written record of all people present at the gathering for the purpose of providing the record to the Chief Public Health Officer to facilitate contact tracing, if necessary, which record must be stored in a safe, secure location for one month after creation of the record and then disposed of using a secure destruction method to maintain the confidentiality of personal information collected under this section; and
  - (d) does not hold the gathering inside a private residence.
26. Organized gatherings, including worship services, of more than 50 persons to a maximum of 100 persons, are permitted to be held at an indoor or outdoor location provided:
- (a) the organizer of the gathering is not organizing a wedding or a funeral;
  - (b) the organizer of the gathering ensures the premises or place where the gathering is held is physically divided into separate areas which contain no more than 50 persons each; and
  - (c) the organizer of the gathering:
    - (i) obtains prior approval from the Chief Public Health Officer;
    - (ii) develops, follows and makes available for inspection an operational plan detailing how risk of transmission of COVID-19 will be mitigated at the gathering;
    - (iii) takes every reasonable step to ensure minimal interaction of people within two metres of each other;
    - (iv) maintains a written record of all people present at the gathering for the purpose of providing the record to the Chief Public Health Officer to facilitate contact tracing, if necessary, which record must be stored in a safe, secure location for one month after creation of the record and then disposed of using a secure destruction method to maintain the confidentiality of personal information collected under this section;

- (v) does not hold the gathering inside a private residence;
  - (vi) complies, to the extent possible, with the Multiple Gatherings Guidance; and
  - (vii) complies with any other directions issued by the Chief Public Health Officer.
27. In addition to the requirements above, a business, service or organization holding an organized gathering must comply with the Businesses, Services and Organizations section of this Order.
28. The operator of a business or facility must not knowingly rent, reserve or allow the business or facility to be used for an organized gathering that would contravene the Organized Gatherings section of this Order.
29. Any person attending an organized gathering shall take every reasonable step to maintain a distance of two metres or more from persons who do not reside in their household.

#### **Long-Term Care Facilities and Nursing Homes Visitation**

30. Visitation to long-term care facilities and nursing homes is permitted provided the facility complies with the Chief Public Health Officer's Directive on Visitation to Long-Term Care Facilities and Nursing Homes, as may be amended from time to time.

#### **General**

31. Notwithstanding anything in this Order, the Chief Public Health Officer may exempt a person or class of persons from the application of any section of this Order under exceptional circumstances or on reasonable grounds.
32. For greater certainty, nothing in this Order limits the operation of the Act or its regulations or restricts the ability of the Chief Public Health Officer to issue public health orders or other orders or directives, as necessary.
33. This Order:
- (a) revokes and replaces my order of December 8, 2020;
  - (b) is effective on December 18, 2020 at 8:01 a.m., except where stated in this Order to have retroactive effect; and
  - (c) shall remain in effect for the duration of the public health emergency in the Province, unless earlier amended or revoked.

**(a) in clause (2)(a), by the deletion of the words “19 years of age” and the substitution of the words “25 years of age”; and**

## HEALTH AND DENTAL SERVICES COST ASSISTANCE ACT HEALTH AND DENTAL SERVICES COST ASSISTANCE REGULATIONS

(Approved by Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council dated December 15, 2020.)

Pursuant to section 19 of the *Health and Dental Services Cost Assistance Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. H-1.21, Council made the following regulations:

### PART 1 – INTERPRETATION AND ADMINISTRATION

#### Interpretation

#### Definitions

**1.** (1) In these regulations,

#### Act

(a) “Act” means the *Health and Dental Services Cost Assistance Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. H-1.21;

#### agreement

(b) “agreement” means an agreement referred to in subsection 3(4) of the Act between the Minister and a participating health

professional or the Minister and a body representing a group of health professionals;

(c) “health card” means a health card as defined in the *Provincial Health Number Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. P-27.01; health card

(d) “spouse” means a spouse as defined in section 29 of the *Family Law Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. F-2.1. spouse

(2) A benefit prescribed in these regulations is a benefit provided in the province, except where Benefits provided in province

- (a) the benefit is provided to an eligible person pursuant to a referral for medical treatment outside the province;
- (b) the benefit is authorized by the Minister; or
- (c) otherwise provided in these regulations.

#### The Plan and Programs

2. An eligible person shall present the person’s health card when requesting a benefit. Health card

3. (1) An eligible person shall promptly report to the administrator of a program, in the form approved by the administrator, a material change in the person’s circumstances that may affect the person’s eligibility or benefits under the program, including a change in Duty to report material change

- (a) the income of the eligible person or the eligible person’s spouse;
- (b) the eligible person’s marital status; or
- (c) the number of dependants of the eligible person or the eligible person’s spouse.

(2) An eligible person shall provide to the administrator the information, including relevant documents or records, required by the administrator to evaluate the applicant’s change in circumstances. Duty to provide information

(3) The administrator shall review the report and information submitted under subsection (1) and (2) and may decide to vary or discontinue the person’s enrollment or the provision of benefits to the person accordingly. Administrator may vary or discontinue

(4) The administrator shall, within 14 days of making a decision under subsection (3), notify the person of the decision, the reasons for the decision and the person’s right to request a review of the decision under subsection 13(1) of the Act. Notice of decision and reasons

4. (1) For the purpose of establishing a separation of spouses, a person shall submit a statutory declaration in the form approved by the Minister confirming the separation and providing the respective addresses of the person and, if known, the person’s spouse. Establishing separation of spouses

(2) Where the administrator of a program is satisfied that an applicant or eligible person has established the separation of the applicant or Spouse’s income not included

eligible person and the applicant's or eligible person's spouse, the spouse's income shall not be included in the calculation of income for the purposes of the applicant's or eligible person's enrollment or participation in the program.

#### Claims

Payor of last resort      **5.** Where an eligible person has or is covered by third-party insurance, the person or a participating health professional shall first submit a claim to the third-party insurer prior to submitting a claim to the administrator of a program.

#### *Claim By Participating Health Professional*

Claim within 90 days      **6.** (1) For the purpose of section 8 of the Act, a participating health professional shall submit a claim within 90 days of providing a benefit for which the cost or part of the cost is payable on behalf of an eligible person and include the following information:

- (a) the identification number of the participating health professional assigned by the Plan;
- (b) the health number of the eligible person;
- (c) the benefit provided;
- (d) the date the benefit was provided;
- (e) the total amount charged for the benefit;
- (f) in the case of a claim in printed form, the name and address of the participating health professional and the signature of the participating health professional or authorized agent;
- (g) the amount or amounts paid by the eligible person or a third party insurer; and
- (h) any further information or other requirements the administrator of the program considers necessary in order to assess the claim and make payment.

Claim for drug      (2) Where a claim is in respect of a drug, the claim shall also include the following information:

- (a) the drug identification number of the benefit dispensed;
- (b) the quantity dispensed;
- (c) the intended duration of the therapy, stated in days;
- (d) the date the benefit was dispensed;
- (e) the prescription number;
- (f) the dispensing fee charged;
- (g) the total amount charged for the benefit;
- (h) whether the prescription was new or a repeat of a previous prescription;
- (i) the identification number of the prescriber, as assigned or confirmed by the Plan;
- (j) the identification number of the dispensing pharmacist, as assigned or confirmed by the Plan;

(k) the amount or amounts paid by the eligible person or a third party insurer; and

(l) any further information or other requirements the administrator of the program considers necessary in order to assess the claim and make payment.

(3) Where a claim is rejected by the administrator of the program, a participating health professional may submit it again for reconsideration, with amendment or explanation, within 90 days from the date on which the benefit was provided.

Resubmission of claim

(4) Where a claim is paid by the administrator of the program, the claim is considered paid in full and no other claim shall be made by or against any other person.

Claim paid in full

(5) Where a claim is submitted and paid in error, the participating health professional who submitted the claim shall, within 90 days from the date of payment, submit a reversal of the claim, and the amount of the incorrect payment shall be recovered by the administrator of the program by deduction from the payment of other claims submitted by that health professional.

Reversal of claim

7. The payment of any fees to a participating health professional for providing a benefit to an eligible person under a program shall be in accordance with an agreement or an order of the Minister.

Fees for providing benefit

#### *Claim by Eligible Person*

8. Where a participating health professional is unable to

Direct charge for benefit

(a) confirm the eligibility of a person under a program;

(b) confirm a benefit under a program; or

(c) successfully submit a claim to the administrator electronically, the participating health professional may directly charge the person for the cost of the benefit, and the person may submit a claim to the Plan.

9. (1) For the purpose of section 8 of the Act, an eligible person shall submit a claim within 6 months of receiving a benefit for which the cost or part of the cost is payable to the eligible person and include the following information:

Claim within 6 months

(a) the benefit provided;

(b) the date the benefit was provided;

(c) the total amount charged for the benefit;

(d) a detailed receipt;

(e) the health number of the eligible person.

(2) Where a claim is in respect of a drug, the claim shall also include the following information:

Claim for drug

(a) the prescription number;

(b) the drug identification number of the benefit dispensed;

(c) the quantity dispensed;

- (d) the identity of the prescriber;
- (e) the total cost of the prescription.

## PART 2 - FERTILITY TREATMENT PROGRAM

- 10.** In this Part,
- Definitions
- formulary (a) “formulary” means the formulary established under section 3.1 of the *Drug Cost Assistance Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap D-14.1;
- income (b) “income” means, in respect of an individual, the amount calculated using the following values shown on the individual’s income tax return for the most recent taxation year for which the filing deadline has passed, as filed with and verified by the Canada Revenue Agency:  
Income = Line 15000 (total income)  
less Line 21000 (split pensions amount)  
less Line 21400 (child care expenses)  
less Line 22000 (support payments made);
- Program (c) “Program” means the Fertility Treatment Program established in this Part.
- Program established **11.** (1) The Fertility Treatment Program is established in this Part as a program under the Plan.
- Benefits under Program (2) The benefits under the Program are the payment of the cost or part of the cost of the following, less any reimbursement from third-party insurance, not exceeding in total the eligible person’s maximum benefit:  
(a) in vitro fertilization treatment performed in Canada;  
(b) intrauterine insemination treatment performed in Canada;  
(c) drugs listed in the formulary for the purposes of the Program.
- Maximum benefit (3) The maximum benefit available to an eligible person in a 12-month period is the amount listed in the second column of the following table opposite the applicable range in the first column of the following table of  
(a) the income of the eligible person; or  
(b) where the eligible person has a spouse, the total of the income of the eligible person and the income of the eligible person’s spouse.

### Maximum Benefit

<u>Income</u> (Income of eligible person or income of eligible person + spouse)	<u>Maximum Benefit Amount</u> (per 12 months)
\$0 - 50,000	\$10,000
>50,000 – 100,000	7,500
>100,000	5,000



(4) The administrator may refuse to provide any benefit under the Program unless and until the administrator is provided with the information necessary to calculate the income of the eligible person and the eligible person's spouse, if applicable, and the maximum benefit available to the eligible person.

Refusal to provide benefit

**12.** (1) A resident is eligible for enrollment in the Program if the resident is entitled to basic health services under the *Health Services Payment Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. H-2 and insured services under the *Hospital and Diagnostic Services Insurance Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. H-8.

Eligibility

(2) Enrollment in the Program is valid for a term of 12 months and an eligible person is limited to a maximum enrollment of three 12-month terms.

Term of enrollment

(3) An eligible person ceases to be eligible for benefits under the Program on the earliest of the day the person

Eligibility ceases

- (a) leaves the province to establish residence in another province or country;
- (b) ceases to be entitled to basic health services under the *Health Services Payment Act* and insured services under the *Hospital and Diagnostic Services Insurance Act*;
- (c) reaches the person's maximum benefit; or
- (d) ceases to be enrolled in the Program.

**13.** These regulations come into force on January 1, 2021.

Commencement

### EXPLANATORY NOTES

**SECTION 1** defines certain terms used in these regulations and clarifies that a benefit prescribed in these regulations is a benefit provided in the province except in specified circumstances.

**SECTION 2** requires an eligible person to present the person's health card when requesting a benefit.

**SECTION 3** requires an eligible person to report a material change in circumstances that might affect the person's eligibility or benefits and provide any relevant information to the administrator of the program. It provides for the administrator to determine whether the person's enrollment or benefits should be varied or discontinued and requires the administrator to notify the person of a decision to do so.

**SECTION 4** requires the submission of a statutory declaration to establish that spouses are separated and, in that case, prohibits the inclusion of a spouse's income for the purpose of determining an applicant's eligibility for a program or benefits.

**SECTION 5** requires an eligible person or participating health professional to submit a claim to the eligible person's third party insurer before submitting a claim to the administrator of a program.

**SECTION 6** sets out the claim process for a participating health professional making a claim on behalf of an eligible person.

**SECTION 7** provides that the payment of any fees to a participating health professional for providing a benefit to an eligible person shall be in accordance with an agreement or an order of the Minister.

**SECTION 8** sets out circumstances in which a participating health professional may directly charge an eligible person for the cost of a benefit.

**SECTION 9** sets out the claim process for an eligible person.

**SECTION 10** defines certain terms used in Part 2 of these regulations.

**SECTION 11** establishes the Fertility Treatment Program under the Plan, sets out the benefits available under the program and establishes the maximum benefit available in a 12-month period based on income.

**SECTION 12** provides that a resident is eligible for enrollment in the Fertility Treatment Program if the resident is eligible for basic health services and insured hospital services. It provides that enrollment is for a term of 12 months and is limited to three 12-month terms. It also sets out circumstances in which an eligible person ceases to be eligible for benefits.

**REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL PLANNERS ACT  
GENERAL REGULATIONS**

(Approved by Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council dated December 15, 2020.)

Pursuant to section 48 of the *Registered Professional Planners Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. R-9.1, the council, with the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, made the following regulations:

(a) “Act” means the *Registered Professional Planners Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. R-9.1; Act

(b) “responsible professional planning experience” means experience in planning gained through employment in a planning environment that meets the standards established by the Professional Standards Board. responsible professional planning experience

**2. (1)** For the purpose of subclause 11(2)(b)(ii) of the Act, an applicant for registration as a candidate shall have his or her qualifications evaluated by the Professional Standards Board through its prior learning assessment recognition process. Evaluation by PSB

(2) For the purpose of subclause 11(2)(b)(ii) of the Act, an applicant for registration as a candidate is required to have successfully completed Candidate, education and experience

(a) a post-secondary degree, other than a post-secondary degree in planning accredited or recognized by the Professional Standards Board; and

(b) at least five years of responsible professional planning experience,

which, together with any other relevant education and work experience, enable the applicant to meet the standards of competency and knowledge for a candidate established by the Professional Standards Board.

**3. (1)** For the purpose of subclause 12(2)(a)(i) of the Act, a candidate applying for registration as a registered professional planner shall have his or her qualifications evaluated by the Professional Standards Board. Evaluation by PSB

(2) For the purpose of paragraph 12(2)(a)(i)(A) of the Act, a candidate shall have completed at least one year of mentorship, conducted in accordance with the standards established by the Professional Standards Mentorship

Board, with a mentor who has been registered, licensed or certified as a professional planner in a Canadian jurisdiction for at least three years.

(3) For the purpose of paragraph 12(2)(a)(i)(B) of the Act

(a) a candidate who meets the requirement in subclause 11(2)(b)(i) of the Act shall have completed at least two years of responsible professional planning experience; and

(b) a candidate who meets the requirement in subclause 11(2)(b)(ii) or (iii) of the Act shall have completed at least one year of responsible professional planning experience,

verified by a sponsor who has been registered, licensed or certified as a professional planner in a Canadian jurisdiction for at least three years.

Mentor and sponsor

(4) For the purpose of subsections (2) and (3), a person may not be both a mentor and a sponsor for a candidate.

(5) For the purpose of subsection (3), a sponsorship shall be conducted in accordance with the standards established by the Professional Standards Board.

(6) For the purpose of paragraph 12(2)(a)(i)(C) of the Act, the prescribed ethics and professionalism course is the course provided by the Professional Standards Board.

met the requirements for continuing professional development set out in the bylaws.

(4) Where the applicant's registration was suspended or cancelled pursuant to subsection 15(1) of the Act for contravening subclause 11(3)(a)(iii) or 12(3)(a)(iii) of the Act, the council may reinstate the registration if the applicant pays the outstanding annual registration fee and any other applicable fees in accordance with section 17 of the Act and the bylaws.

(5) Where the applicant's registration was suspended or cancelled pursuant to subsection 15(2) of the Act, the council may reinstate the registration if the applicant satisfies the council that he or she is suitable to practise as a registered professional planner.

(1) Pursuant to section 17 of the Act, a registrant whose registration was suspended, or a former registrant whose registration was cancelled, on request pursuant to section 16 of the Act may apply to the council, within two years of the date of the suspension or cancellation, as the case may be, in the form approved by the council to have the registration reinstated in accordance with this section.

(2) Where the applicant's registration was suspended on request pursuant to subsection 16(1), the council may reinstate the registration if the applicant has complied with the terms and conditions of registration in clause 11(3)(a) or 12(3)(a) of the Act, as the case may be, during the suspension.

(3) Where the applicant's registration was cancelled on request pursuant to subsection 16(2) of the Act, in addition to the terms and conditions in subsection 11(3) or 12(3) of the Act, as the case may be, it is a term and condition of a registration on reinstatement that the registrant shall complete continuing professional development as directed by the Registrar, within the time period directed by the Registrar.

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**EXPLANATORY NOTES**

**SECTION 1** revokes section 1 of the *Summary Proceedings Act* Ticket Regulations and substitutes a new section 1 to specify the form of ticket for the purposes of section 10 of the *Summary Proceedings Act* R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. S-9 is set out in Schedule 1 to the regulations. The form of an electronic ticket for the purposes of section 10.1 of the Act is set out in Schedule 1.01 to the regulations.

**SECTION 2** amends section 2 of the regulations to clarify that provincial offences under the provisions of enactments set out in Schedule 2 to the regulations are designated as offences in respect of which a ticket may be issued for the purposes of section 10 or 10.1 of the Act.

**SECTION 3** amends subsection 3(1) of the regulations to replace outdated language.

**SECTION 4** revokes section 5 of the regulations and substitutes a new section 5 to prescribe the criteria required to complete an electronic ticket. A new section 6 is added to the regulations to specify the printing requirements for an electronic ticket.

**SECTION 5** revokes the “Summons to Accused” as set out in Schedule 1 to the regulations and substitutes a new “Summons to Accused” in Schedule 1 due to a change in address of the Provincial/Youth Court in Charlottetown.

**SECTION 6** adds a new Schedule 1.01 to the regulations.

**SECTION 7** provides for the commencement of the regulations.
