

A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ¹ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.



Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. Economic Review 2024

Overview

The Prince Edward Island economy performed well in 2024, with continued strong growth in employment and wages, strength in the manufacturing and exports sectors, continued growth in tourism, and a very strong and significant resumption in activity in construction and housing. Inflation continued to return to the Bank of Canada's target of two percent, interest rates continued to decline, and population growth began to trend toward a level where both the benefits and responsibilities of population growth began to become more manageable.

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 3.6 percent in 2024. Increases were recorded in 18 of the 20 major industry groups. Notable leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2017 chained prices) construction (up by \$64.1 million or 12.4 percent), real estate and rental and leasing (up by \$49.4 million or 5.0 percent), health care and social assistance (up by \$33.5 million or 4.4 percent), agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (up by \$25.9 million or 4.8 percent), and manufacturing (up by \$23.0 million or 2.9 percent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2024 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2025.


According to the Labour Force Survey, employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 3.6 percent to average 92,500 for the year, following a 6.2 percent increase in 2023. The unemployment rate averaged 8.0 percent in 2024, up 0.8 percentage points from 2023. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, payroll employment on Prince Edward Island was up by 1.7 percent in 2024 while total labour income increased by 9.2 percent.

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was up 1.8 percent in 2024 compared to 2023. Energy prices decreased 1.6 percent, while food prices increased 3.5 percent and shelter was up by 3.0 percent. The *All-Items CPI* for Canada increased by 2.4 percent in 2024.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island reached \$3.5 billion in 2024, increasing by 6.8 percent over 2023. This follows a rise of 8.1 percent in 2023. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 7.8 percent in 2024 to reach \$2.5 billion, a new all time high. This follows increases of 17.4 percent in both 2022 and 2023.

The Canadian Economy

Nationally, economic growth was moderate in 2024, rising 1.6 percent, matching the growth in 2023. Growth was consistent over the course of the year, ranging from 0.5 percent in the first and third quarters to 0.7 percent for the second quarter. Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 6.0 percent in 2021 and by 4.1 percent in 2022. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2021 and 2024.



Exports of goods and services increased by 1.8 percent, following a 1.1 percent increase in 2023. Household final consumption expenditure rose by 5.1 percent following 5.6 percent growth in 2023.

GDP for goods producing industries decreased by 0.1 percent in 2024 while service producing industries rose 2.2 percent. Notable increases included *real estate and rental and leasing*, up 2.9 percent, *health care and social assistance*, up 3.6 percent, *education services*, up 4.1 percent, *finance and insurance*, up 2.9 percent, and *mining*, up 3.9 percent⁵.

The all-items consumer price index for Canada increased 2.4 percent in 2024. Notable increases were in *food*, up 2.7 percent, *health and personal care*, up 3.2 percent, *shelter*, up 5.7 percent, and *tobacco*, *alcohol*, *and cannabis*, up 3.0 percent. Core inflation (all items excluding food and energy) was 2.6 percent in 2024.⁶



As commodity prices continued to increase, the Canadian dollar exchange rate also rose in 2024, averaging \$1.37 US.

Employment increased by 1.9 percent to 20.7 million, while the unemployment rate averaged 6.3 percent in 2024, an increase of 0.9 percentage points from 2023. Employment was up in the services sector by 2.4 percent, while goods sector employment rose 0.1 percent. Notable employment growth occurred in *health* care and social assistance, up 4.6 percent, professional, scientific, and technical services, up 4.3 percent, and educational services, up 3.6 percent. Diagram 2 shows percent employment change in Canada by sector.




The American Economy

Real GDP in the United States increased 2.8 percent in 2024, following 2.9 percent growth in 2023. The increase in GDP for 2024 was mainly due to increases in consumer spending, investment, state and local government spending, and exports. Diagram 3 shows U.S. GDP growth from 2014 to 2023.



Employment in the United States grew by 0.3 percent in 2024 and the unemployment rate increase 0.4 percentage points from 3.6 percent in 2023 to 4.0 percent in 2024.¹⁰ Diagram 4 shows U.S. employment and unemployment rate from 2015 to 2024.





The Prince Edward Island Economy

Following growth of 2.1 percent in 2023, economic growth for PEI accelerated to 3.6 percent in 2024. The Island continued to be a destination for international migrants, while inter-provincial migration slowed, dropping population growth to 2.8 percent, following growth of 3.9 percent in 2023. Employment reached an all-time high of 92,500 in 2024, while new records were also set in retail trade and international exports.

Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy grew by 3.6 percent in chained 2017 dollars in 2024, following growth of 2.1 percent in 2023 and 4.6 percent in 2022. ¹¹ By comparison, the Canadian economy expanded by 4.1 percent in 2022, 1.6 percent in 2023, and 1.6 percent in 2024. Consumer Prices


The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island increased 1.8 percent in 2024, following a 2.9 percent increase in 2023. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy, and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 1.9 percent in 2024. Food prices increased by 3.5 percent over 2023, while shelter costs rose by 3.0 percent. The CPI Energy index decreased 1.6 percent in 2024 following a decline of 6.2 percent in 2023. The *All-items CPI* for Canada increased 2.4 percent in 2024.¹³

Diagram 6 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2017 and 2024. Gasoline prices (regular self-serve) averaged \$1.669 per litre for 2024. Prices ranged from a low of \$1.566 in January to a high of \$1.780 per litre in May. The price of home heating oil averaged \$1.291per litre in 2024, ranging from a high of \$1.439 per litre in February to a low of \$1.116 per litre in October. Labour Force


Employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 3.6 percent, following a rise of 6.2 percent in 2023. Employment averaged 92,500 people, a new all-time high for annual employment on Prince Edward Island. Employment in the goods-producing sector increased by 3.6 percent in 2024, with employment levels increasing in construction (15.6 percent) and forestry, fishing, mining, quarrying, oil and gas (4.8 percent), while employment declined in agriculture (-4.9 percent) and manufacturing (-3.8 percent). Employment in the service providing sector increased by 3.3 percent. The labour force participation rate rose from 66.2 percent in 2023 to 66.5 percent in 2024. The annual average unemployment rate increased from 7.2 percent in 2023 to 8.0 percent in 2024. National employment increased 1.9 percent in 2024, with an unemployment rate of 6.3 percent.¹⁵

Diagram 7 shows that the *construction* and *transportation and warehousing* industries led employment growth in 2024. Other notable gains occurred in *accommodation and food services* and *business*, *building*, and other support services. Notable employment losses occurred in manufacturing and agriculture.¹⁶

Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours (SEPH) shows that payroll employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 1.7 percent in 2024, following an increase of 3.3 percent in 2023. By comparison, national payroll employment increased 1.0 percent. By this measure, notable employment growth was seen in *health care and social assistance, construction* and *manufacturing*. Employment in *public administration* increased at all levels of government, led by a 2.4 percent increase in *federal public administration*.¹⁷

Labour productivity on PEI fell 1.1 percent in 2024 from 2023, as compared to a drop of 0.5 percent for Canada as whole. Over the past five years, PEI's labour productivity has decreased by 1.3 percent.¹⁸


Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 9.2 percent to reach \$5.4 billion in 2024, while labour income for Canada increased 5.9 percent. Diagram 8 shows labour income growth from 2015 to 2024. The major contributors to growth in 2024 were in *professional and personal services* (up 12.8 percent), *construction* (up 18.4 percent), and *health care and social assistance* (up 9.9 percent). ¹⁹ For more information about expenditures, incomes and wages, see Tables 26 to 38.

Population

As of July 1, 2024, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated to be 178,550, an increase of 4,837 people, or 2.8 percent, over 2023. The population of Canada increased by 3.0 percent over the same period.

International immigration increased in 2023/24, with 4,149 immigrants arriving on PEI from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024. This is an increase of 33.2 percent as compared to the previous 12-month period and the highest on record. Other international migration²⁰ totaled 924, resulting in a total of 5,073 for net international migration.

Net interprovincial migration saw 82 more people moving to PEI from other parts of Canada than those leaving the Island. Ontario, Nova Scotia, and Quebec were the top provinces of origin for PEI's interprovincial in-migrants. Estimates of interprovincial migration can be found in tables 5A and 5B.

Between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024, the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,379. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,697, resulting in natural growth (births minus deaths) of -318.²¹

The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age²² has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 (start of current data series) to 41.3 years in 2024. The median age for Canada over that same period has risen from 26.2 to 40.3. Recent immigration efforts have lowered the median age each year since 2016 from a high of 44.0, however this downward trend is not projected to continue. Furthermore, while only 11.0 percent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion has risen to 20.6 percent in

2024, compared to 18.9 percent for Canada, and continues to rise. The total dependency ratio²³ reached a low of 46.8 in 2007 and changed very little from 2007 to 2011. This ratio has increased to 53.2 in 2024.²⁴

2021 Census of Population

According to the 2021 Census of Population count on May 11, 2021 there were 154,331 persons living on Prince Edward Island at that time.²⁵ There were 43,530 census families living in private households, with an average household size of 2.8 people. Among census families in 2021, 69.5 percent were married couples, 15.0 percent were common-law couples and 15.5 percent were one-parent families. There were 360 same-gender couples and 155 transgender or non-binary couples.

PEI's population is predominately English speaking, as 86.9 percent of PEI's population reported English only as mother tongue, down from 91.5 percent in 2016. Those reporting French only as mother tongue made up 3.0 percent of the population, as compared to 3.8 percent in 2016. The percentage of the population reporting only a non-official language as mother tongue was 8.5 percent, up from 5.4 percent in 2016. The five most common non-official languages reported as mother tongue in PEI were Mandarin at 2.1 percent, Punjabi (Panjabi) at 0.9 percent, Tagalog (Pilipino, Filipino) at 0.8 percent, Arabic at 0.5 percent, and Vietnamese at 0.4 percent. In total, 92 different languages were reported as mother tongue for PEI in the 2021 Census.

According to the 2021 Census, 11,765 people, or 7.8 percent of the population, were foreign-born (immigrants) and 5,435, or 3.6 percent were non-permanent residents. Among immigrants, 4,860 came between 2016 and 2021. These recent immigrants made up 41.3 percent of the immigrant population. The top three places of birth among immigrants living in Prince Edward Island in 2021 were China, the United Kingdom, and the United States. Among recent immigrants living in Prince Edward Island, they were China, India, and the Philippines.



Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Total shipments increased by 7.4 percent in 2024 to a value of \$3.6 billion, a new all-time high. Shipments have increased every year since 2010 with the exception of the pandemic year of 2020. Durable goods increased 10.7 percent, while shipments of non-durable goods rose by 5.9 percent.²⁶ Diagram 9 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2019 to 2024. Employment in the manufacturing sector decreased 3.8 percent over 2023 to 7,700 in 2024. Nationally, total manufacturing shipments decreased 1.7 percent in 2024.²⁷



Exports

According to Industry Canada, the total value of PEI's exported goods grew from \$2.3 billion in 2023 to \$2.5 billion in 2024, an increase of 7.8 percent. Exports of *frozen food products* made up 30.7 percent of all international exports of goods in 2024. Frozen food product exports increased from \$696.6 million in 2023 to \$774.1 million in 2024, an increase of 11.1 percent. Other top exports included *seafood products* valued at \$350.3 million (up 6.5 percent from 2023), \$191.0 million in *vegetable and melon farming* (down 17.6 percent), and *pharmaceutical and medicine* at \$163.2 million (down 4.5 percent). Total exports for Canada in 2024 increased 1.3 percent.

Exports from PEI to the European Union have almost than tripled (up 191.9 percent) since 2017, when the Canada – European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) went into effect. Over that period, exports of *pharmaceutical and medicine products* (up 301.1 percent), *seafood products* (up 120.1 percent), and *other basic organic chemical products* (up 189.4 percent) have led PEI exports to the

EU. As a result, Belgium, Spain, and Ireland have moved into the top 10 countries for PEI exports over this period, joining France and Germany on the list. Significant gains have also been seen in PEI exports to other EU countries such as Greece, Italy, Netherlands, Sweden and Denmark.²⁸

Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2024 totaled \$829.2 million, an increase of 2.8 percent over 2023. This compares to a decrease of 1.6 percent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts for PEI totaled \$532.9 million, a decline of 1.6 percent. Potato receipts, which made up 73.7 percent of total crop receipts, decreased 4.0 percent to total \$392.9 million. Total livestock receipts increased by 9.2 percent to \$213.0 million, largely due to a 7.7 percent rise in dairy receipts and an 11.4 percent increase in cattle receipts. Total direct payments to farmers were up 19.7 percent due largely to a 60.7 percent increase in crop insurance payments.²⁹

The total farm product price index increased by 2.4 percent in 2024. The price index rose in every major commodity group except for fruit (-32.9 percent) and grains (-11.1 percent). For crops, vegetable prices saw the largest increase, at 13.2 percent, while potato prices increased by 4.8 percent. Livestock prices also saw increases, with cattle prices leading the way, rising 15.4 percent. For more data on Agriculture, see tables 66 to 78.


Retail Trade

Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2024 increased for the fifteenth consecutive year, with a 1.5 percent increase, as compared to a 1.3 percent increase for Canada as whole. Sales for Prince Edward Island were valued at \$3.6 billion. Notable increases were seen in *motor vehicle and parts dealers*, up 5.3 percent or \$45.4 million, *pharmacies and personal care* stores, up 7.6 percent or \$18.0 million, and *gasoline stations*, up 2.1 percent or \$12.1 million. Diagram 10 shows retail sales growth since 2015.

The number of new vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island saw an increase of 834 units (10.9 percent) in 2024 to total 8,500, following a 13.1 percent increase in 2023. The value of new vehicles sold increased by 6.6 percent, rising to \$394.6 million.³¹ Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector was 11,000, an increase of 0.9 percent compared to 2023.³² For information about the retail trade sector see Tables 50 and 51.


Fisheries

The *Department of Fisheries, Tourism, Sport and Culture* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2024 rose 16.2 percent to \$450.0 million, following a 9.2 percent decrease in 2023. Molluscs and crustaceans remain by far the top species of the Island fishery comprising 98.1 percent of the total value of all fish landings. Total lobster landings increased by 7.0 percent in 2024, which along with higher prices, contributed to the total value increasing 19.9 percent to \$358.4 million. Diagram 11 shows the value of lobster landings on PEI from 2015 to 2024. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs increased 7.8 percent in 2024.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish decreased 34.0 percent in 2024 to 3.1 million pounds.

Notable increases in prices received by fishers were seen for snow crab (up 33.3 percent to \$4.00 /lb.) and lobster (up 12.0 percent to \$7.63/lb.). The price for oysters increased 2.8 percent to average of \$1.85/lb in 2024, while the price for mussels was unchanged at \$0.85/lb. For more data on fisheries and aquaculture, see Tables 80 to 84.

Tourism

Tourism had a positive year in 2024, with 1.7 million visitors coming to the Island. This was an increase of 6.0 percent over 2023 and surpassed the previous record set in 2019.

The total number of room nights sold at fixed roof accommodations rose by 0.7 percent in 2024, following a decline of 4.3 percent in 2023. Occupancy rates at Island accommodations dipped slightly to 46.0 percent from 47.9 percent in 2023, however remained above the pre-pandemic level of 45.6 percent seen in 2019. Site nights sold at campgrounds increased 9.6 percent and the occupancy rate rose to 52.5 percent, up from 52.3 percent in 2023.³³

2024 saw continued strong growth in air traffic. The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport was up 2.0 percent, rising from 402,686 in 2023 to 410,773 in 2024.³⁴

Total ferry passengers³⁵ increased by 7.2 percent in 2024, following a decrease of 5.4 percent in 2023.³⁶ Mechanical issues resulted in ferry service interruptions for several weeks during peak season of 2024. Total ferry passengers in 2024 remained 14.6 percent below the 2019 level. Annual bridge traffic increased by 4.1 percent in 2024, following an 11.4 percent increase in 2023. Bridge traffic has increased each year since 2020. Summer bridge traffic (July and August) increased 0.7 percent over the same period in 2023.³⁷

Charlottetown saw an all-time high of 94 cruise ship visits in 2024, which brought 152,490 passengers, surpassing pre-pandemic levels.

Construction, Investment and Housing

Statistics Canada estimates that total non-residential capital expenditures on Prince Edward Island valued \$1.3 billion in 2024, an increase of 12.0 percent over 2023.³⁸ Public sector investment increased from \$530.0 million in 2023 to \$712.6 million in 2024, an increase of 26.4 percent, while private sector investment was virtually unchanged from \$637.4 million in 2023 to \$637.5 million in 2024.³⁹

Non-residential construction investment increased by 16.4 percent in 2024, due to an 18.5 percent increase in commercial investment and a 35.2 percent increase in government and institutional investment.

Total residential investment increased 37.6 percent in 2024, following a 0.4 percent drop in 2023. This was largely due to increased investment in single family dwellings, which rose by 51.4 percent. Investment in multi-unit dwellings increased 24.7 percent, while investment in other types of units fell 0.4 percent in 2024. ⁴⁰

The *Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation* (CMHC) estimated that there were 1,694 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2024, the most since 1973. This is up by 555, or 48.7 percent, from 2023. As seen in Diagram 12, the annual increase was mostly due to increased starts in apartments and other multi-unit dwellings (83.8 percent).⁴¹



The annual vacancy rate for apartment structures of six units and over in Charlottetown rose 0.1 percentage point, from 0.6 percent in 2023 to 0.7 percent in 2024. At the same time, the rate in Summerside fell from 2.7 percent in 2023 to 0.8 percent in 2024. For more information on Housing, Investment and Construction see Tables 57 to 65.

Energy

Total electricity capability on Prince Edward Island increased slightly in 2024 to 557 megawatts. Net peak load for the province in 2024 was 346 megawatts. PEI's total electric supply increased 3.0 percent over 2023 to 1.8 million megawatt hours, with 1.5 million megawatt hours received from other provinces. The average monthly cost for 500 kWh of electricity increased 3.8 percent in 2024, rising from \$103.62 in 2023 to \$107.58 in 2024.⁴³

The volume of gasoline sold decreased 3.4 percent in 2024 and the average price fell 0.2 percent. The sale of light fuel oil (furnace oil) dropped 9.9 percent and the average price decreased 8.8 percent.⁴⁴ The volume of light fuel oil sold has declined 35.2 percent since 2019, as programs to transition households to electric heat have expanded.

Prince Edward Island's greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions were 1,592 kilotonnes CO2e (1.602 Mt CO2e) in 2023, the most recent year for which data is available. This is a decrease of 14,000 tonnes over 2022, or -0.9 percent. Transportation is the biggest source of greenhouse gas emissions in Prince Edward Island, accounting for 45.0 percent of total emissions in 2023, followed by agriculture (21.7 percent) and buildings

(17.2 percent). On a per capita basis, PEI's GHG emissions were 9.2 tonnes in 2023, down from 9.6 tonnes in 2022. This was the second lowest among provinces, with only Quebec lower at 8.9 tonnes, and compares to 17.3 tonnes for Canada as a whole. ⁴⁵ For more information on Energy see Tables 90 to 99.

The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 2.8 percent in 2024. Employment in the *health and social services* sector rose by 3.7 percent, while employment in the *education* sector increased by 3.3 percent.⁴⁶

Provincial Finance

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations for fiscal year 2023/24 shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$3.0 billion in total revenue, 4.8 percent higher than in FY 2022/23. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$1.8 billion, an increase of 3.5 percent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 38.7 percent to the province's total revenue in FY 2023/24 compared to 37.9 percent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 11.7 percent to value \$561.2 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments increased 12.0 percent to total \$294.1 million. Total expenditures rose 5.9 percent to reach \$3.0 billion. The Consolidated Statement of Operations shows a deficit for FY 2023/24 in the amount of \$14.8 million. As of March 31, 2024 the provincial net debt was \$2.6 billion, up 8.0 percent from 2023. More data on the government sector can be found in Tables 117 to 120.





Note: Statistics Canada has two monthly programs that measure employment levels and trends: the Labour Force Survey (LFS) and the Survey of Payroll, Employment and Hours (SEPH). The LFS is a household survey while SEPH is a payroll or establishment survey. The LFS provides a broader picture of employment, including employment in agriculture and the number of self employed. SEPH provides a highly reliable gauge of monthly change in non-farm payroll employment. Both the LFS and SEPH, along with information on the number of people receiving regular employment insurance, are useful for a complete picture of supply of the labour market.



Results of the Canadian Income Survey should not be compared to those produced by the Survey of Labour and Income Dynamics or other previous income surveys.

The low income cut-offs before tax (LICO-BT) are income thresholds below which a family will likely devote a larger share of its before-tax income on the necessities of food, shelter and clothing than the average family. The approach is essentially to estimate an income threshold at which families are expected to spend 20 percentage points more than the average family on food, shelter and clothing, based on the 1992 Family Expenditures Survey. LICOs are calculated in this manner for seven family sizes and five community sizes.

The Market Basket Measure (MBM) is based on the cost of a specific basket of goods and services representing a modest, basic standard of living. It includes the costs of food, clothing, shelter, transportation and other items for a reference family. These costs are compared to the disposable income of families to determine whether or not they fall below the poverty line.

Low income measures (LIMs), are relative measures of low income, set at 50% of adjusted median household income. These measures are categorized according to the number of persons present in the household, reflecting the economies of scale inherent in household size.

An economic family refers to a group of two or more persons who live in the same dwelling and are related to each other by blood, marriage, common-law, adoption c a foster relationship.




